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CALL TO ORDER

Commission Chair Newman called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

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APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Commissioner Cox made the motion to approve the agenda as is. Commissioner Manuel seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

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APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Commissioner Manuel asked to correct the name of "Carol Hunter" to "Carol Tunner" on page two of the February minutes. Commissioner Cox made the motion to approve the minutes with the change requested by Commissioner Manuel. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Perry and it passed unanimously.

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CITIZEN REPORTS

None

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CITY COUNCIL UPDATE

Councilor Fogle asked for any questions from the Commissioners. Commissioner Manuel asked about the water rate increases. Councilor Fogle explained that there will be an increase in the water rates each year through 2022. The City will pursue an external loan, an internal loan and have the general fund contribute \$750,000 per year for 8 years to pay for the principal portion of the internal loan. If the City had increased rates over the past several years like other cities, it would not have to implement this plan, he said. The funding will be used to improve the Water Treatment Plant and undertake a comprehensive water line replacement program, he explained.

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STAFF UPDATE

Bethany Clark's report included:

- The First Reading of an amended ordinance for the Elks Lodge Historic Landmark is scheduled for March 19th. The original ordinance had to be amended, however, because the property owners next door sent a letter requesting that the Lovelander Hotel be removed from the name of the property. Their concern was that they hold the legal name of the Lovelander Hotel and, therefore, do not want it used in the Elks Lodge designation name.
- The Walking Tour brochures will be reprinted with the last page highlighting ArtSpace events. They will be available in time for May's HP events.
- The preliminary form for the Historic Downtown District and a grant application for consultant funding will be submitted soon. Commissioners were asked to assist in requesting letters of support from downtown property owners. Commission Chair Newman said he would draft a letter to be signed by property owners and asked other commissioners to help get it signed.

- Andy Carlson of Wattle and Daub is scheduled to be back out at the Swartz Farmstead on March 21 to
 look inside the structures. This will help him formulate a more accurate cost estimate. Commissioner
 Perry said he will be able to attend the site visit. Next steps were discussed. Once the City Manager and
 Directors review the information a meeting will be scheduled with the HPC and LHS. A revised proposal
 will probably be requested outlining funding sources and project phases.
- The National Register form for the Milner-Schwarz House is due June 3rd. Information about an I-House is needed. Commissioners Armentrout and Berglund said they will do some research and send it to Bethany.

CONSIDERATION OF NEW BUSINESS

DESIGN REVIEWS DOS AND DON'TS

Bethany Clark introduced Dan Corson from History Colorado who was invited to discuss the design review process. Commissioner Newman recapped the HPC's concerns. Recently an alteration certificate was submitted which was incomplete and clearly did not meet the design standards, he explained. Knowing that it did not meet the criteria and to save the applicant time, two commissioners and staff met with the applicant to assist in clarifying what was necessary to meet the standards. The applicant was upset that he would not receive approval on the plans he submitted. Commissioners were concerned about how to handle future applicants.

Dan Corson recommended:

- Do not hold meetings with applicants outside of Public Hearings unless it is specified in the Ordinance.
- Commissioners should not review the application unless it is complete.
- Stick to the criteria
- Do not design it for them or provide design suggestions; rather, explain what is incompatible in relation to the criteria
- Use the phrase "I believe it does not meet the criteria." Do not use the phrases "I feel, I like, or I think."
- Notice all pre-meetings with the applicant (if any) even if there are only two Commissioners
- Attend other cities' design review meetings to gain knowledge of how they handle the process.
- Gather samples of alterations certificates and review them for practice.

There was a discussion amongst the Commissioners and Dan Corson. The HPC asked staff to:

- Amend the Ordinance to allow for "optional pre-application meetings"
- Create a disclaimer for the applicant to sign prior to the pre- application meeting acknowledging the HPC is not directing them on how to design their project, only advising them of the criteria and standards they agreed to when their property was designated.

HP MONTH PLANNING

Bethany Clark referred to the calendar for May is Historic Preservation Month. She asked the Commissioners if they decided on the event they would like to sponsor.

- Bethany Clark said she spoke with Carol Tunner and she may do the Ghost sign presentation on May 30th.
- Commission Chair Newman said he will be meeting with other Commissioners about the Realtor and Contractor Workshop. He said Robin Ericson agreed to assist. Nikki Garshelis said she is waiting for a response back from the Loveland Berthoud Association of Realtors to see if they will allow their conference room to be used as a venue.
- Commissioner Kersley said she spoke to Stonecraft staff and they indicated they would be able to give a presentation. They said a Friday would be best. She will follow up to see if there is a charge and a specific date.

- Commissioner Perry volunteered to give the historic walking tour. He offered a flyer from 1977 featuring 35 homes which could be distributed during the month.
- Commissioner Cox said he would like to have a linseed oil paint workshop and will follow up with the company.

There was a discussion about the possibility of other workshops like the value of historic preservation, a local author regarding how research is done and an architectural presentation.

COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

- Commission Chair Newman suggested having meetings prior to the Commission meeting. There was a
 discussion about scheduling a regular monthly meeting, holding the meetings on an as need basis. He
 would like to review the agendas and add to it prior to the meeting. Commissioner Manuel suggested
 one of the meetings be a study session about alteration certificates.
- Commission Chair Newman reported that he and Commissioner Berglund attended the Boards &
 Commissions Summit and was honored that the Mayor and City Staff expressed their gratitude for all
 the hard work the commissioners do. He also thanked Bethany and Nikki for their work for the HPC.
- Commission Chair Newman said he met with Sharon Danhauer and Bill Meirath of the Loveland Historical Society to learn more about the history of the Viestenz-Smith Mountain Park. Once he learns all the historical background he will meet with Greg George and Gary Havener about applying for State and National designation, he said. Local designation is not possible due to the property being outside of Loveland City Limits.

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Staff Update

Staff Update Format:

The staff update contains informational items. Five minutes is set aside on the agenda for brief questions and comments on staff update items.

If a more in-depth discussion or extensive questions on a specific item is desired, staff requests that the HPC Chair establish if it is the Commission's consensus to have a longer discussion. Staff will be happy to answer questions on any item with individual commissioners after the meeting.

If the staff update indicates that staff will be pursuing a particular course of action, no comment from the Commission indicates that the Historic Preservation Commission is supportive of that course of action.

Staff Update Items:

Walking Tour Brochures

A new set of the Historic Walking Tour Brochures has been printed and the City's Economic Development Department has agreed to pay for the new brochures. We are working with Economic Development to determine if they can take over the distribution of the brochures as City marketing material. Staff will be reserving brochures for HPC events and the May walking tour.

Historic Downtown District

Staff has submitted a grant application to the State Historical Fund for the purpose of hiring a consultant to carry out the research and prepare a National Register of Historic Places nomination application for a proposed Historic Downtown. The amount requested in the grant, \$16,215, includes consultant fees, public outreach, and staff project administration. Staff will likely not be notified until August if the grant has been awarded.

Swartz Farmstead

The consultant from Wattle & Daub has prepared a two-phased approach and budget estimate for the rehabilitation of the Swartz Farmstead buildings. Staff has scheduled a meeting with Parks & Recreation and the City Manager to discuss next steps.


Great Western Railway Depot

Strategic Planning staff met with members of the Loveland Historical Society and Larimer County City Planners to discuss a proposal to annex a portion of the Great Western Railway Depot property into Loveland. The Historical Society has been working with Great Western/OmniTrax on a proposal to lease the historic depot building and restore it to become a museum. Discussions with Larimer County Planners revealed that a Minor Land Division might be possible in order to annex a small piece of the property. This would allow LHS to work with one agency (the City) for their needs such as parking, utilities, and desire to designate the property as a historic landmark. A CRT has been scheduled for April 18th to answer many of LHS' questions.

RE: Legal Questions Answered

Per the direction of the HPC, staff has met with the City Attorney in order to respond to questions about open meetings requirements, e-mail policies, and the request to study adding an optional meeting with applicants in the design review process. We have received the following information.

What is a "meeting" that is subject to the Colorado Open Meetings Act?

- Any gathering of three or more Commissioners at which formal action may be taken or where public business is to be discussed as part of a policy-making process is considered a "meeting" under the Open Meetings Act (C.R.S. §24-6-402).
 - This includes any meetings where Commissioners would be making decisions on behalf of the Commission.
 - o It is better to err on the side of caution.
- Includes gatherings in person, by telephone, electronically (i.e., e-mail and chat-rooms), or by other means of communication.
- Does <u>not</u> include e-mail or chat-room communications between Commissioners which do not relate to
 or discuss any public business (i.e., an e-mail or chat room discussion regarding a Commissioner's recent
 vacation).
- Does <u>not</u> include any chance meeting or social gathering of Commissioners at which the discussion of public business is not the central purpose (i.e., holiday party or service club meeting).

What are the posting requirements for Open Meetings?

- Notice of each regular and special meeting shall be posted at least twenty-four (24) hours in advance of the meeting.
- The notice shall be posted at a location designated by the City Council, including the bulletin board outside the City Council Chambers. The public notice should also be posted on the City's website.
- The notice should contain a specific agenda if possible, and be in the format specified by the City Clerk.

What is the recommended policy for e-mail communications between Commissioners?

- Any communications which relate to public business, matters of policy-making, or other decisions by the Commission is better left for meetings open to the public.
- No formal action by the Commission may be made through e-mail communications.

- For items such as Demolition Reviews or the initial review of Landmark Alterations that are sent out through e-mail, only the designated reviewers should discuss the items. Other Commissioners should not weigh-in with their opinion.
- E-mail communication involving City of Loveland e-mail addresses are subject to the Colorado Open Records Act and can be obtained upon request through the City Clerk's Office.
- It is better to be safe and avoid violating ex-parte communication rules (An ex-parte communication is a communication to a Commissioner Member about a pending HPC matter that occurs in the absence of other parties to the matter and without notice and opportunity for all parties to participate in the communication).

<u>Is it Possible to Add an Optional Pre-Public Hearing Meeting with Applicants in the Landmark Alteration</u> Process?

- The Landmark Alteration Certificate process is a Quasi-Judicial process. Quasi-judicial decisions involve the determination of the rights, duties, and obligations of a specific individual or entity on the basis of the application of existing law or policy to past or present facts developed at a noticed hearing conducted for the purpose of resolving the particular interests in question.
 - o In other words, in Landmark Alteration Certificates, the HPC is called upon formally to hear facts and make a decision similar to what judges do in court.
- The purpose of the public hearing is to apply constitutional due process (fair hearing) requirements. In
 deciding quasi-judicial matters, Commissioners are constrained because they are acting as judge and
 jury in deciding the matter and, therefore, should make their decisions like a judge and jury would. This
 means that Commissioners should:
 - o <u>only</u> consider and rely on the information and evidence presented as part of the record at the hearing and, therefore, not consider or rely on information or evidence outside the record;
 - not have off-the-record communications with parties and City staff involved in a quasi-judicial matter, which would mean in a Landmark Alteration no off-the-record communications concerning the merits of the matter with the applicant, opponents to the application, or City planning staff;
 - not rely on specific personal knowledge of a fact relating to the matter unless there is independent evidence presented at the hearing which confirms the Commissioner's personal knowledge of that fact; and
 - o decide the matter in a fair and impartial manner by applying the applicable City Code provisions and standards to the evidence presented at the public hearing.
- To sum up, staff has been advised that a meeting between Commissioners and the Applicant prior to a
 public hearing may impair the opportunity for due process and could lead to a legal challenge. Allowing
 for the two Commissioners who perform an initial review to provide design suggestions to an applicant
 impairs the requirement for a fair and impartial hearing and a decision to be made by the Commission as
 a body.
 - Instead, staff was advised to keep the current process in place with all communications to the
 applicant to come directly from staff. Staff will also provide the applicant with documents about
 what criteria the Commission uses to evaluate alterations, including where to find the Secretary
 of the Interior's Standards.
 - Pre-application meetings with staff are already strongly encouraged, but could be required through a code amendment.

HP Month Workshop

Each May, the Historic Preservation Commission hosts an event or workshop furthering the education to our citizens about historic preservation during Historic Preservation Month. As you know, Commissioner Kersley has been in contact with two organizations that could put on in-depth hands-on workshops. Both organizations charge \$500 for the workshop. The Historic Preservation budget has allocated \$500 for workshops throughout the year, so if the Commission wishes to host one of these workshops, there is money in the budget to do so. The Commission will need to make a decision on which workshop to host. Following is information about each workshop:

Wood Window Preservation Workshop

Presenter: Mike Perschbacher, partner, Older Than Dirt Construction

Using a model of a window frame with double hung sashes, the demonstration will show all the parts of the frame and sashes, how the frame fits into the wall, how to remove the sashes, which parts are expendable. Also discussed: R value, weather stripping, old growth vs. new wood, and insulation methods.

Using deteriorated sashes the demonstration will show how to safely remove paint and failed glazing, repair/rebuild only severely damaged/deteriorated parts, restore using epoxy, install glass and glazing. Also discussed are products used and adapted to the Colorado climate.

Masonry Restoration

Presenter: Terry Alexander, president, Stonecraft

Terry will discuss case studies of Colorado masonry projects, crack repairs in stone and brick, joint repair, re-pointing, paint removal, stain removal, and a Jahn mortar patching demonstration for stone and brick. The presentation will end with a question and answer period.

Commission Decision:

Option 1: Approve to use \$500 out of the Historic Preservation budget to host the Wood Window Restoration Workshop.

Option 2: Approve to use \$500 out of the Historic Preservation budget to host the Masonry Repair Workshop.

Option 3: Deny funding a workshop for Historic Preservation Month.

HP Month Advertising

The Historic Preservation Commission additionally provides outreach and advertising for other organizations' events to promote Historic Preservation Month. The Commission each year has worked with the Reporter-Herald to place advertisements for events each week. Commissioner Berglund has been in contact with the Reporter-Herald to obtain pricing information similar to last year's pricing. Last year, the Reporter-Herald offered a non-profit rate of \$14.63 per column inch on a 2 column wide (3.4" wide) x 10 inch tall or 20 column inch ads and free color so \$292.60. The ads were buy one get one free and ran 4 times, for a total price of \$585.20. The first two weeks featured an ad with events during the first half of the month and the second two weeks featured an ad with events running during the last half of the month (samples attached). The Reporter-Herald is offering us the same rate this year.

Commission Decision

Option 1: Approve a maximum of \$600 out of the Historic Preservation budget to be used on advertising Historic Preservation Month in the Reporter-Herald

Option 2: Deny funding for advertising in the Reporter-Herald.

He stopped a power-play shot by Brad Richards, made a save on Artem Anisimov between the circles and used his stick to deflect a pass from the boards by Carl Hagelin in the final minute just before it got to Marian Gaborik on the edge of the crease.

Lundqvist's best stop in the third was on Dainius Zubrus on a shot from behind the circles.

Facing elimination and down 2-0 after 20 minutes, the Rangers found their game in the second period and tied the game at 2-all on goals by Fedotenko and Callahan in a roughly four-minute span.


