Call to Order:

Chairman Swanty called the Fire & Rescue Authority Board meeting to order on the above date at 1:05 p.m.

<u>Pledge of Allegiance:</u>

The Board participated in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call:

Secretary Sterkel conducted roll call.

Awards and Presentations: Chief Mirowski introduced our new civilian plans reviewer Ingrid McMillan-Ernst. Ingrid will be working with Deputy Fire Marshal Carie Dann in the Community Safety Division. Deputy Fire Marshal Dann indicated that they are working on getting Ingrid "up to speed" on the processes for Planning & Zoning, Building and Suppression reviews and permitting. Ingrid said that she is an architect with 25 years of experience working on large projects. She is anxious to learn more about fire systems and is very excited to be part of Loveland Fire Rescue Authority.

Public Comment: None

Consent Agenda:

Mayor Gutierrez moved to approve the Consent Agenda. City Manager Cahill seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Regular Agenda:

2. Consider Approval of the Basic Services Model Through 2020

PSA Director Wheeler reviewed a spreadsheet that shows the differences between the original 2013 budget and the proposed 2014 budget. She explained that the numbers in the first five years of the plan were developed in 2010. The variances to the plan from its initial version forward are highlighted on page 11 of the agenda packet. Chief Mirowski added that the Type 6 Engine was not included in the Strategic Plan. PSA Director Wheeler indicated that we also didn't include inflationary projections when we did our 2010 projections forward. Her numbers now include a 5% increase for inflation each year.

One of the items that PSA Director Wheeler said we need to look at is Station 10's construction and the timing for that to make sure it is feasible. Chief Mirowski asked that the Board give their approval to move forward next year with an analysis for Station 10 as it relates to costs, timelines, etc. The Board also expressed that attention needs to be given to Station 11 planning. When the Highway 402 corridor begins to develop we will need to make sure we have fire coverage in that area. Mayor Gutierrez indicated that decisions made by homeowners in that area relative to oil and gas development may impact decision as well. City Manager Cahill said that the City is in the beginning stages of planning for that area and we need to look at all indicators before a location is selected for a fire station.

Beyond the current Basic Services Model there are a variety of programs that are still being considered for the 2014 Budget Request. There are 10 items listed on page 12 of the agenda. Chief Mirowski said that out of the ten bulleted items, six of them fall under the 4th pillar of the Vision Tour. We need to make pay plan adjustments for market alignments. Chairman Swanty asked if we will be able to re-adjust within our current pay plan. City Manager Cahill said there are several elements that will need to be looked at like exempt vs. overtime, etc. With the City now using an electronic evaluation system, it will calculate staff evaluation ratings more appropriately for "pay for performance".

City Manager Cahill asked if we have adjusted the capital project numbers to reflect Fire Station 2 costs. Chief Mirowski said that we're about 30-45 days out from having more accurate construction costs. Mayor Gutierrez moved to approve the 2013 Basic Services Model through 2020 as presented. City Manager Cahill seconded the motion and it carried.

3. Review Briefing Papers and Correspondence

- Chief Mirowski said that March was one of the busiest that we have experienced in quite some time with four structure fires and two wildland fires that we responded to.
- Chief Mirowski reported that Reserve Engine 6 was involved in a rear-end accident while on scene of another MVA. Our crew was checking for injuries in the original MVA when another vehicle slammed into the rear of the engine causing significant damage to the tailboard and damaging one compartment. No damage estimate has been received yet.
- Chief Mirowski said we have assigned Division Chief Ned Sparks as the department's new Fire Marshal and head of the Community Safety Division. The process to fill his vacancy as Division Chief for operations will be an internal process. Chief Davis and Chief Ward have expressed a desire to go through that interview process which will take place on Tuesday, April 16th.
- Rural Board President Legits shared information relative to a new fire station that the Big Thompson Canyon Firefighters are working on. The new station will be located on Storm Mountain. The current rural station is inadequate and has many issues such as storm draining, no maintenance room and is poorly located. A local resident on Storm Mountain has agreed to lease ½ acre for 20 years for the purpose of this station. Documents have been submitted to the County and will go before the Planning Commission on May 15th. The new station will be built mostly with volunteer labor and will take approximately 2 years to complete. The goal is to keep the budget under \$100,000 for the station. Funding for the station will come from the Rural Fire Protection District and will not impact the City or the Fire Authority Board.
- Chief Mirowski talked briefly about an upcoming Public Safety Summit which will include LFRA, LPD and TVEMS. A meeting will be held in late May or early June to discuss further details.
- Chief Mirowski handed out a letter that he drafted to Firework vendors for the 2013 season. He asked the Board to review the letter for any possible changes or concerns. Mayor Gutierrez said he wasn't sure that we should have an exact date (May 21st) that the Council would make a decision as to whether firework sales will be allowed this year. Mayor Gutierrez asked Chief Mirowski to share the draft with Councilor Fogle since he is absent from this meeting.
- City Manager Cahill said that at the upcoming City Council meeting, they will talk about the Open Fire Burn Ban process and consider changing the Municipal Code to allow the City Manager and/or City Council to make a timely decision if weather conditions warrant one.

- Chief Mirowski attended a meeting regarding wildland transitions between county and city in large incidents. He feels that we have a good working relationship with the county. He commended the Sheriff and his staff for putting the meeting together because there was good dialogue between the different agencies that might respond to an event. He has asked Lt. Mialy to research what LFRA has in place for a "Delegation of Authority" document.
- Chairman Swanty asked if we track burn permits that we issue. PSA Director Wheeler directed him to the month-end report at the end of the agenda where that information is tracked.
- Mayor Gutierrez congratulated Chief Sparks on his new position.

With no further business at hand, Chairman Swanty moved to adjourn the meeting. Meeting was adjourned at 2:25 pm.

Consider Approval of a Supplemental Appropriation of 2012 Budget Savings and New Projects

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Appropriation of the supplemental budget after the approval of both the governing partners is the final step of the approval process in compliance with the intergovernmental agreement establishing the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority, Section 4.1. The Fire Authority Board approved the supplemental budget request for use of the 2012 budget savings and the Community Safety Lieutenant at the March 14, 2013 board meeting. The Loveland Rural Fire Protection District approved the request April 3, 2013. The City of Loveland approved the supplemental budget on April 16, 2013 and is expected to approve the supplemental appropriation for the City contribution to the LFRA supplemental budget on second reading May 7, 2013.

BACKGROUND

A public hearing was posted and conducted on this supplemental budget at the March LFRA meeting. This meeting has been posted as a public hearing, as a conservative measure. There have been no changes to the figures in the resolution from the time it was originally approved by the Board in March. The process is in compliance with the provisions in the intergovernmental agreement for establishing the Fire Authority.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Approve as submitted

FINANCIAL/ECONOMIC IMPACTS

The reinvestment of 2012 budget savings allows for the completion of projects in the process and appropriates funding for the Community Safety Division (CSD) Lieutenant. The CSD position was a consideration during the development of the 2013 budget but was postponed until it was clear that the Rural District mill levy increase would be approved by the voters of the district.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>R-019</u> A RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING A SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET TO THE 2013 LOVELAND FIRE RESCUE AUTHORITY BUDGET FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDING FROM THE CITY OF LOVELAND AND FROM LOVELAND RURAL FIRE PROECTION DISTRICT FROM REMAINING FUNDS FOR PROJECTS APPROVED BUT NOT COMPLETED IN 2012 AND NEW PROJECTS

WHEREAS, the City's 2012 budget included appropriations for projects not completed or closed out by the end of 2012, when the 2012 budget appropriations expired in accordance with the City of Loveland Charter and state law, requiring reappropriation in 2013 to permit expenditure of such funds to continue with respect to ongoing projects; and

WHEREAS, the Rural District's 2012 budget included appropriations for projects not completed or closed out by the end of 2012, when the 2012 budget appropriations expired in accordance with the state law, requiring reappropriation in 2013 to permit expenditure of such funds to continue with respect to ongoing projects; and

WHEREAS, the City and the Rural District have also received or have reserved funds not anticipated or appropriated at the time of the adoption of the City budget and the Rural District budget for 2012; and

WHEREAS, the City Council authorized the expenditure of these funds by enacting a supplemental budget and appropriation to the City budget for 2013 on second reading May 7, 2013, as authorized by Section 11-6(a) of the Loveland City Charter; and

WHEREAS, the Rural District Board desires to authorize the expenditure of these funds by enacting a supplemental budget and appropriation to the Rural District budget for 2013 on April 3,2013, as authorized by state law; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has requested that City and Rural District reserve funds be appropriated to fund the operations expenditures identified below, according to the provisions of the Intergovernmental Agreement creating the Authority, which provide for allocating the payment of costs and expenses of the Authority between the City at 82% and the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District at 18%; and

WHEREAS, the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority Board desires to authorize the expenditure of these funds from the City of Loveland and the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District for operating expenditures in 2013 as identified below.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF THE LOVELAND FIRE RESCUE AUTHORITY, STATE OF COLORADO, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. That additional funds from Thompson Valley Emergency Medical Services of \$13,000, the City of Loveland of \$249,140 and the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District of \$54,690 not appropriated at the time of adoption of the budget for 2013 have resulted from expenditures that were budgeted in the 2012 budget but not made and to add the new Community

Safety Lieutenant position. Appropriation of \$316,830 is necessary to permit expenditure of the funds in 2013 for purposes previously approved by Council and the Rural Board and for new projects. Discuss the 2013 First Quarter Budget Report – Budget Biz

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The 2013 first quarter budget report is submitted for the Board's review of the LFRA budget performance. It is intended to report all resources committed to the Fire Authority operations and capital. There are three sections of the report the Budget Status, Other Budgeted Resources, and In the Works.

BACKGROUND

The *Budget Biz* report is intended to highlight budget performance and issues that influence the resources available to deliver the mission of the LFRA. The primary audience is the LFRA Board, but it is available to the public. It is currently on the LFRA Board page of the website. It is designed as a three section report. The *Budget Status* section of the report highlights the comparisons of the budget to actual revenues and expenditures in the Fire Authority Fund. The *Other Budgeted Resources* section highlights other resources within the City that are appropriated for Fire. The *In the Works* section highlights processes that are necessary to secure resources for the Fire Authority and features initiatives or major purchases that are not yet complete but impact the budgetary comparisons in future reports.

The budget to actual comparisons for revenues and expenditures in the Fire Authority Fund are presented at 25% of 2013. Revenues are in the Fire Authority Fund are at 16.1% of the annual budget, compared to 19% last year. The total is less than expected because a credit was given to the City in January for the cash advance necessary at 2012 year end due to accruals (revenue recognized as earned according to generally accepted accounting principles but cash didn't flow through the accounts until Jan 2). Expenditures in the Fire Authority Fund are at 19.9% of the annual budget, compared to 20.7% last year.

Budget Biz

Welcome to the fourth issue of the quarterly budget report for the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority (LFRA). This report is designed to provide information related to fiscal accountability. It is available on the website and accessible to anyone that is interested. It is designed to assist the LFRA Board with monitoring the budget status for all resources that assist with delivering service to the citizens of the City of Loveland and the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District.

There are three sections of the report: LFRA Budget Status, Other Resources, and In the Works. The Budget Status section will highlight the budget status for revenues and expenditures for the Fire Authority Fund from year to date, January through March, 2013. The expenditures will be presented by program and account category at the department level. Each of these financial presentations will include variance explanations when the current percentage of the total budget is significantly different from the percentage of the year (i.e., first guarter is 25% of the year). There are resources outside of the Fire Authority Fund that are critical to our service delivery mission. The Other Resources section is devoted to highlighting the status of budgets that are outside of the Fire Authority Fund. The next section of the report will provide status information on the various processes used to develop long term and short term operational and capital planning. It is also intended to highlight significant financial transactions or strategies that the department is working on to advance the strategic plan and deliver cost effective services.

Quarter 1 at 25% of 2013

- Revenues are in the Fire Authority Fund are at 16.1% of the annual budget, compared to 19% last year.
- Expenditures in the Fire Authority Fund are at 19.9% of the annual budget, compared to 20.7% last year.
- Station 2 conceptual drawings are complete and the preliminary budget is in the ٠ "value engineering" process to align with resources expected to be available in the City Fire Capital Expansion Fee Fund.
- Heavy Rescue Truck for the new Station 2, Battalion Chief Command Vehicle ٠ and the new Type 6 are all in the purchasing process.
- LFRA Board has approved a financial plan to serve as a basis for ٠ developing the 2014 Budget.
- Through commitment, composion and courage, the mission of the Loveland Fire In partnership with The Lauren Project and a federal grant, smoke Rescue Authority URAN is to protect and carbon monoxide detectors are being installed in low income and disable households in the community.
- ٠ A supplemental budget appropriation for the investment of 2012 budget savings has been approved by the LFRA Board, the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District and the Loveland City Council. City funds remaining for fire projects are expected to be approved May 7, 2013.

This is just a function of building activity to date.

(3) Miscellaneous

Wage reimbursement for the Deputy Fire Marshall.

(4) Rural Fire District

March is billed and collected in April.

(5) Other Agency Deployment

We have only received one reimbursement for the Fern Lake Deployment.

(6) Contribution - Loveland

The December 2012 advance to cover accruals was credited back against the January contribution (\$288,996).

(7) Hazmat Billing

This is the reimbursement of hazmat incident costs. KLLM Transport billing for \$5,530 and the fourth and final payment for the Englemen settlement \$7,911.44.

In the Works

Grants

In 2013, the only active grant is the Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detector Grant. The smoke and carbon monoxide detectors were purchased and federally reimbursed in 2012. The installation of the units in low income and disabled housing is in progress in 2013 in collaboration with the Lauren Project. Their leadership, based on a similar project in Windsor, has been instrumental in organizing the logistics of the survey work and soliciting volunteers. Maps to guide volunteers



for canvasing targeted areas of the community were developed with the help of the City's Development Services Department. During this phase of the project, volunteers survey households to provide information on smoke and carbon monoxide risks and the proper installation of detectors. If a need for detectors is identified, then the installation teams of firefighters and other volunteers are contacted. Lauren Project and City Boards and Commission volunteers served as survey team leaders for each installation date. Around 60 Colorado State University students showed up on the first survey and installation date to assist with every aspect of the project. Three Loveland High Schools were scheduled to complete survey work. Two high schools have

completed work and due to weather the final school has been rescheduled. As of the middle of April, 252 smoke and 189 carbon monoxide detectors have been installed. 2,016 smoke detectors and 672 carbon monoxide detectors purchased with grant money must be installed by August.

Capital

- The Heavy Rescue for Station 2 is on order.
- The Type 6 is on order.
- The Battalion Chief Command Vehicle is purchased near completion.
- Station 2 land Planning Commission land annexations hearings are complete, and the annexation proceedings will be heard by City Council in May. Belford Watkins, the architect firm, has developed construction drawings and a preliminary budget. The "value engineering" process has begun to refine that budget based on expected resource availability in the City's Fire Capital Expansion Fee Fund.





Administrative Actions

Vision Tour presentations have been completed for all political officials, advisory board members, and staff members. These presentations are held at the beginning of each year. The objective of these presentations is two-fold: recap and celebrate achievements for the previous year and set the goals and expectations for the current year focused on Strategic Plan phased implementation.

In the Works Continued...

- "Good to Great" meetings were conducted for all levels of staff in the organization and an on-line survey has also been completed by 40% of the department. The intent of these meetings was to receive feedback on the organization for the purpose of continuous improvements and the establishment of the initiatives for building the fourth pillar of success (the Human Resource Asset) that was highlighted in the Vision Tour.
- 2013 Awards Ceremony was held in February to recognize many extraordinary contributions in 2012.
- LFRA Sponsored the Blue Card Hazard Zone Management Symposium and the Emergency Managers State Conference at the Loveland Embassy Suites hotel in February. These were state and national conferences and featured extraordinary speakers, including our own Chief Mirowski and Chief Ward.
- LFRA Board approved an intergovernmental agreement with Larimer County for Wildland and Forest Fire Mitigation in January.
- LFRA Board approved a Capital Fixed Asset Policy in February to ensure appropriate internal controls for managing LFRA assets.





- LFRA Board approved the staff recommendations for investing the 2012 Budget savings to complete projects and advance some initiatives for the Strategic Plan in 2013 in the form of a supplemental budget at their March meeting. The Loveland Rural Fire Protection District approved them as well at their April meeting. The City of Loveland approved the Fire Authority Fund supplemental budget and approved the City fund recommendations on first reading at their April 16 meeting and will hear the second reading on May 7. Based on the partner board approvals, LFRA will appropriate the supplemental budget on May 9.
- LFRA Board approved a ten year financial plan on April 11 for the phased implementation of the Basic Services Model in the Strategic Plan to use as the basis for developing the 2014 budget.
- LFRA Board agreed that it would be good business practice to send a letter to fireworks vendors that a ban on the sale of
 fireworks would be under consideration given the expected drought conditions so that they could make decisions about
 inventory. The Chief brought a draft of that letter to the April meeting, and it was approved for distribution with minor
 modifications.
- Chief Mirowski partnered with the City Manager to present to the Loveland City Council a streamlined method for declaring a fire ban in the City limits so that the City could be more responsive as the City and Larimer County assess risks associated with the expected drought conditions. City Council approved that methodology April 16.
- Discussions are in progress for auto-aid agreements with the Johnstown Fire Protection District and the Berthoud Fire Protection District.
- 2012 International Fire Code Amendments are expected to be considered by Loveland City Council in late May, early June.
- Two supplemental appropriations have been approved by all the governing partners during this quarter: \$71,000 for a Plans Reviewer (82% City and 18% Rural District) and \$75,000 for the Battalion Chief's Command Vehicle (100% Rural District). The originally adopted budget was: \$9,878,290 + \$71,000 + \$75,000 = \$10,024,290, the current budget.
- A new Plans Reviewer was hired to join the Community Safety team, Ingrid McMillan-Ernst.

Discuss the Station 10 Planning Process

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This discussion is intended to explore the process that should be established to plan for the construction of Station 10 in the western portion of the LFRA service area. Several process outcomes related to the location and the funding of the station will be critical.

BACKGROUND

Phase III of the Strategic Plan identified a need for a station on the west side of the service area to improve response times to meet the 5 minute 59 second standard in 2016. It is anticipated that this station could be as far west as Glade Road, or perhaps even County Road 27. This new station would improve significantly service and initial response for the west side of the fire district. The calls dispatched for this station would also lessen the impact on Station 3 and Station 2 allowing LFRA to be more responsive in the urban response area.

During the City's 2013 budget development process the station construction was moved out to 2018 based on the expected availability of the City's Fire Capital Expansion Fees. The version of the Basic Services Model approved as a basis for developing the 2014 budget at the last LFRA Board meeting reflected that the station would be built in 2018 and included a 40% contribution from the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District, arbitrarily included as a placeholder until this process could be completed.

The capital and operations estimates have been updated. The capital costs for this station are estimated at \$2,605,000. This estimate is based on a 9,000 square foot station that is anticipated to cost \$225 per square foot or \$2,025,000 for construction, \$230,000 for general conditions, and \$350,000 for site costs. The current operations cost estimate is \$1,335,200 for staffing and facilities maintenance starting in 2019.

Planning process outcomes need to be discussed at this LFRA board meeting to establish the scope of the work to be performed. Staff has identified a few of those outcomes for consideration from both the strategic and tactical perspective:

- Location
- Response profile and equipment to be assigned
- Metrics for determining the appropriate contributions from each governing partner
- Construction timeline considering expected funding sources and availability for both partners

It is anticipated that this evaluation process would be performed by an ad hoc sub-committee of the LFRA Board with representation from the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District and the City of Loveland, supported by LFRA staff. Are there other stakeholders that should be included?

Loveland Fire Rescue Authority Board Fire Chief's Monthly Report- April



For May Board Meeting, 2013

This monthly report is intended as an update to the Fire Authority Board on important information that impacts the organization and the authority board.

April a Return to Normalcy- The month of March was one of the busiest that we have experienced in quite some time. April returned us to a more normal state where we still had numerous accidents and MVA's with extrications, the total for structure fires, wildland incidents and shift recalls were down to normal or average numbers. The wet weather of April had a lot to do with both.

LFRA Executive and Staff Level Positions- Greg Ward has been promoted to the position of Division Chief in charge of Operations. Chief ward will be with us for the May LFRA Board meeting and share briefly with the board his vision and what his plan of action will be.

Other Promotions and Assignments-- With Chief Ward's promotion, we will have a series of other promotions, and ultimately appointments to the positions of full-time and part-time firefighters. The month of May and June will be very busy with these processes. Just for the Boards information and edification, these assessment centers and processes are managed internally with participation from other regional fire department representatives and representation from the City of Loveland Human Resources Department.

Station Two- In May, we will have several significant meetings impacting the future of new fire station two. On May 7, City Council will review the annexation and zoning request that was unanimously approved by the Planning Commission in March. We will also be having several meetings in May to work on the final design of the station with the purpose of "value engineering" to ensure that the final pricing estimates and our available CEF's are in alignment.

Burn Bans and Burn Restrictions- During the month of April, City Council reviewed the new ordinance allowing the City Manager and City Council the ability to enact a burn ban or burn restrictions. Council passed the ordinance on first reading with an 8-1 vote. The second reading and adoption is scheduled for the May 7 Council meeting.

New Delegation of Authority Document for Wildland Fires- In April, Larimer County held a regional wildland summit attended by numerous fire-rescue personnel in northern Colorado. A significant topic of discussion was the changing environment and resources in the wildland urban interface (WUI). Included in the discussion was the introduction of a new "Delegation of Authority document. Chief Mirowski will comment on this item; a copy of the new delegation document is included in this portion of your packet.

Front Range Fire Consortium- LFRA has been a long-standing member of the Front Range Fire Consortium (FRFC), a cooperative group of the nine largest fire departments in Northern Colorado and Southern Wyoming. FRFC has operated for nearly 15 years as an organization with great success in bringing more proficiency, unity and cost savings to the to the fire service of this region. In 2013, the organization will be writing its first strategic plan as the guiding document for the next 8-10 years. Chief Mirowski is the Chairman of FRFC and will be heading up this project. The document will provide the framework to ensure that the strong relationships and effectiveness of the FRFC will be in place for the next decade and beyond.

Auto Aid Agreements with Berthoud and Johnstown- Chief Sparks has continued his work with the other chiefs from both Berthoud and Johnstown in order to establish an automatic aid agreement for the southeast area of our fire district. *This is the one remaining area in our district that we have no auto aid agreements*. All parties are interested and want to get this established. We hope to have formal agreements in place before the end of the year.

Major Incidents-

- There were several major incidents during the month of April. They included:
 - o Structure fires * Mutual Aid- Structure Fire in Glen Haven
 - Water Rescue * Rist Benson; canoe overturned with two people saved with the assistance of a bystander with the Special Operations Team.

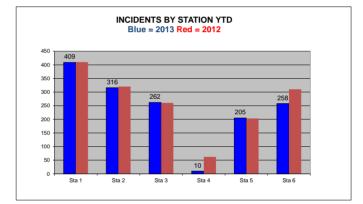

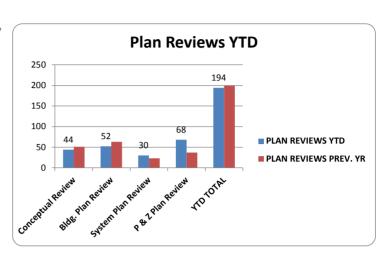

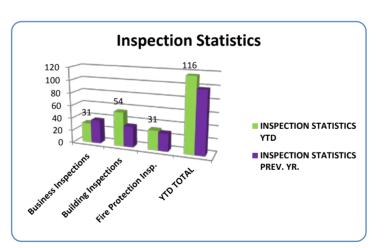
