#### TITLE:

Restorative Justice and Teen Court

#### **SUMMARY:**

Council has asked for information regarding youth offender programs, specifically Restorative Justice and Teen Court, to assist youth in the community who have, or are alleged to have, committed state law or ordinance violations. This presentation will provide Council with information regarding available programs in the community, as well as information regarding the opportunity to partner with the School District and the Restorative Justice Community Council.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Restorative justice programs seek to divert youth, in appropriate cases, from the criminal justice system, reduce offender recidivism, and provide an opportunity for an offender to repair the harm done to the victim and community as a result of the offense committed. The Loveland Police Department previously operated an in-house restorative justice program that was discontinued in 2005, because the number of cases eligible for the program did not justify the cost to provide the program and the effectiveness of the program in reducing recidivism, as analyzed by CSU researchers asked to study the program, was minimal.

In its stead, other resources have been utilized effectively for youth offenders in cases previously appropriate for restorative justice, such as referrals to the Thompson School District restorative practices program, referrals to the District Attorney's Office Diversion Program, and entering into deferred judgments (which allow a case to be dismissed if conditions are successfully met).

The Restorative Justice Community Council (the "RJCC") can provide a restorative justice program as an additional diversion program for youth offenders from the Loveland Municipal Court System. The program contemplates a 3-way partnership among the RJCC, the City and

the School District. The RJCC is a non-profit that is affiliated with restorative justice programs in in Estes Park and the Thompson School District. The proposal to operate a new restorative justice program in Loveland involves the hiring of a part-time staff person by the RJCC who would be housed and provided administrative support by the School District. The requested participation by the City is \$20k per year in funding to support the part-time staff person and partnering in the application and administering of additional grant funding to support the program.

Teen court programs generally involve sentencing recommendations by peers in appropriate cases. A teen court program is a youth program that may be useful as an additional option for youth offenders in the future. Information regarding the use of a teen court program will also be provided to Council at this session.

### Restorative Justice -Loveland history

- Previous Restorative Justice Program
  - Ran in-house by LPD
    - Surcharge to pay for program (now used to fund traffic safety needs)
  - Discontinued in 2006
    - Not cost effective given number of eligible cases
    - Program analysis conducted by CSU showed minimal effect on recidivism and deterrence

### Current resources for youth offenders

- Referral of cases to DA's Office Diversion Program
- Referral of cases to TSD restorative practices program by prosecutors, SROs
- Informal diversion, Deferred Prosecution, Deferred Judgment with conditions-includes opportunity to seal/expunge case if successfully completed
- Sentencing alternatives such as public service hours, completion of appropriate educational programs, restitution, etc.






A Restorative Justice Program for Merchants, Community and Young Shoplifters



**District Attorney:** The Juvenile District Court Division handles the prosecution of offenders who are under the age of 18 who have been charged with committing an misdemeanor or felony offense. The juvenile division also oversees a juvenile diversion program that works with many first time juvenile offenders. The diversion program utilizes education, community and family services to divert the juvenile offenders from the criminal justice system.



## Accessing RJ and other services



# Long-term impact of juvenile records:

- Records pertaining to a juvenile generally cannot be disclosed to the general public. C.R.S. 19-1-304
- A person (regardless of age) may file a petition to seal municipal court and related police records
  - Immediately upon dismissal or acquittal
  - 3 years after conviction and completion of sentence

C.R.S. 24-72-308 and 308.9



Staff is recommending Council consider a request for \$50,000 of Lodging Tax Reserves and \$125,000 of Economic Development Incentive Funds, at a future meeting.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Regional Tourism Act (RTA) is legislation with a subsequent program developed by the State of Colorado Economic Development Commission to provide financial support for the development of regional tourism attractions and associated amenities. The purpose is to increase the attraction of out-of-state visitors and increase visitor spending. The RTA provides for the establishment of an authority which will use the State of Colorado sales tax increment collected in a designated RTA zone for the purpose of financing eligible projects.

Larimer County, the City of Loveland and the Town of Windsor will be considering support for a joint RTA application. The application effort will be led by the private non-profit; Go NoCo. The project concept areas are located at:

- The Larimer County Ranch and Fairgrounds
- Water Valley property in Loveland and Windsor
- Centerra
- Sylvan Dale Guest Ranch

Details of the projects are included in the presentation attached to this report. Total project construction costs are estimated over \$190 million.

### What is the RTA Program?

#### Regional Tourism Act (RTA)

#### **Purpose**

The Regional Tourism Act creates a mechanism for a local government to undertake a regional tourism project to attract out-of-state visitors, to create a regional tourism zone in which the project will be built, and to create a regional tourism authority (or to designate other financing entities) with the power to receive and utilize the increment of revenues derived from the state sales tax collected in the zone, that is above a designated base amount, to be used to finance eligible improvements to the project.

#### The State's Role

The Colorado Office of Economic Development and International Trade (OEDIT) provides administrative support for the Colorado Economic Development Commission (EDC). The EDC has oversight authority for this program. A local community should work with OEDIT to determine application requirements and deadlines to submit completed applications for review by OEDIT. The Business Funding and Incentives Staff will facilitate the application review process, application presentation with structuring recommendations to the EDC, resolution drafting and project monitoring.

#### Requirements

- The EDC shall not approve any project that would likely create an annual state sales tax revenue dedication of more than \$50 million to all regional tourism projects.
- The EDC cannot initially approve more than two projects. Once the EDC approves two initial
  projects, the EDC may approve two additional projects during the next calendar year. Once the EDC
  approves two additional projects, the EDC may approve two additional projects during the following
  calendar year.
- The EDC will:

Review applications forwarded with OEDIT recommendations and may approve or reject the project based on a demonstration that the following criteria are materially met:

- The project is of an extraordinary/unique nature and is reasonably anticipated to contribute significantly to economic development and tourism in the state and communities where the project is located.
- The project is reasonably anticipated to result in a substantial increase in out-of-state tourism.
- A significant portion of sales tax revenue generated by the project is reasonably anticipated to be attributable to transactions with nonresidents of the zone.
- The local government has provided reliable economic data demonstrating that in the absence of state sales tax increment revenue, the project is not reasonably anticipated to be developed within the foreseeable future.

Adopt a resolution for approved applications specifying the following:

- The local government approved to undertake a regional tourism project.
- The area of the regional tourism zone.
- Requested by the local government, authorize the creation of an authority to receive and spend state sales tax increment revenue.
- The percentage of the state sales tax increment revenue that will be dedicated to the project.
- Authorize the collection and use of the state sales tax increment revenue for a designated number of years.
- Authorize the utilization of the state sales tax increment revenue by the financing entity pursuant to the RTA and conditions of approval determined by the EDC.
- Appoint board members to the approved authority when applicable.

- Have the ability to revoke or modify its approval of a project if substantial work on the project does not commence within five years of approval by the EDC.
- Other terms and conditions required by the EDC.

#### **Process**

A local government will need to submit a regional tourism project application to OEDIT within the application cycle deadline. OEDIT will review the application for general completeness and to make an initial determination regarding whether the application has met the general criteria for a regional tourism project. An economic review and report on the application will be completed by an independent Third Party Analyst hired by the Office of State Planning and Budgeting. Applications will be forwarded to any county or counties and adjacent municipalities where the project will be implemented for an opportunity to review the application and submit comments to the EDC within 30 days prior to the scheduled EDC meeting. The EDC will make final approval or denial determinations.
