#### AMENDMENT TO FIRE CODE APPEALS TITLE 15.04 A Motion to Approve and Order Published on Second Reading an Ordinance

Amending Title 15.04 Concerning Fire Code Appeals

This is a legislative action to consider an ordinance on second reading. On February 25, 2015, the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority (LFRA) Board voted to recommend to City Council that a new Fire Code Board of Appeals be established with LFRA Board members. The Fire Authority Board recommends that the Appeals Board be comprised of at least three LFRA Board members, provided that one of the members present is from the Rural District. This ordinance was approved unanimously on first reading by Council at the March 17, 2015 regular meeting.

#### (presenter: Mark Miller) AMENDMENT TO THE CODE TO APPOINT MEMBERS TO THE LOVELAND FIRE RESCUE AUTHORITY AND DISSOLVE THE FIRE RESCUE ADVISORY COMMISSION A Motion to Approve and Order Published on Second Reading an Ordinance Amending the City Code to dissolve the Loveland Fire Rescue Advisory Commission

Note: A slight change was made in the title and enacting language of this ordinance after first reading, to clarify the intent. This in an administrative action to dissolve the Fire Rescue Advisory Commission. The Commission has played an important role in strategic planning and policy considerations. Since Loveland Fire Rescue Authority (LFRA) Board is responsible for setting policy of the Authority, the citizen advisory board that is responsible for bringing the citizen's perspective to policy considerations should be aligned with the decision-making authority. Therefore the LFRA Board voted on January 28, 2015 to make a recommendation to the Loveland City Council to dissolve the Commission as a City Commission. If the City Council approves that action, then the LFRA Board would reinstate the existing members as an ad hoc commission and the LFRA Bylaws would be amended. This ordinance was approved unanimously on first reading by Council at the March 17, 2015 regular meeting.

#### REDUCTION OF SALES TAX ON FOOD FOR HOME CONSUMPTION A Motion to Approve and Order Published on Second Reading an Ordinance Reducing the Sales Tax on Food for Home Consumption

At the March 24, 2015 special meeting, staff presented City Council with information pertaining to Loveland's sales tax on food for home consumption. At that meeting, City Council adopted an ordinance on first reading that reduced sales tax on food for home consumption over a three year period, with the tax being reduced to 2% effective November 1, 2015, 1% effective November 1, 2016 and such sales tax on the sale of food for home consumption would comprise approximately \$6.3 million of General Fund revenue in 2016, with an annual growth rate of approximately 3.5% per year. Reducing or eliminating this sales tax would reduce the General Fund revenue by approximately \$335,000 in 2015; an additional \$2.08 million in 2016; an additional \$2.15 million in 2017; and an additional \$2.19 million in 2018. The total reduction in General Fund Revenue in 2019, after full implementation of the elimination of sales tax on food for home consumption, would be approximately \$6.75 million per year, plus an annual growth rate of approximately 3.5%. This ordinance was approved unanimously on first reading by Council at the March 24, 2015 Special Meeting.

Between funds rolled over from 2013 and supplemental appropriations done in 2014, the percentage split for the budget between the Water Fund and the Water SIF fund is off slightly for these two projects. This ordinance addresses these corrections. The total amount of the appropriations are \$506,200 funded by transfers between the funds. There is no net increase in the total budget for either of the two projects.

## **INVESTMENT REPORT FOR FEBRUARY 2015**

This is an information only item. The budget projection for investment earnings for 2015 is \$1,759,080. On the portfolio's beginning balance this equates to an annual interest rate of 0.84%. For February, earnings of \$94,694 were posted to City funds. Interest rates rose in February, reversing the unrealized gain in January to an unrealized loss of \$532,192. Based on the monthly statement, the estimated annualized yield in February on the securities held by US Bank was 1.06%. Due to draws from fund balances to pay for the cost of scheduled capital projects, flood response, and project repair, the portfolio is about \$8 million lower than December 2013 and \$26.8 million lower than the pre-flood peak.

CONTRACT AWARD FOR RIVER'S EDGE NATURAL AREA RECONSTRUCTION A Motion to Award a Construction Contract for the River's Edge Natural Area Reconstruction Project to Territory Unlimited in an Amount not to Exceed \$696,918 and to Authorize the City Manager to Execute the Contract on Behalf of the City was approved.

This is an administrative action seeking approval of a motion to award a construction contract to Territory Unlimited for a total cost of \$696,918.00, and authorize the City Manager authority to sign the contract. This contract would retain the services of Territory Unlimited as the general contractor to complete the construction of the River's Edge Natural Area Project. The contract cost is the base bid amount of \$666,632.50 along with an addition of \$30,285.50 due to an increase in the amount of hazardous mitigation work included in the request for bids as an add alternate. The additional work is due to the severe flood damage from the September 2013 Flood event. Funding for the construction is fully appropriated in the 2015 Open Lands Fund 202 Budget. Full reimbursement of all costs is anticipated. The City anticipates a 75% FEMA reimbursement and a 12.5% State of Colorado reimbursement for the project from Public Assistance grants. In addition, the City received \$148,718 from CIRSA and a GOCO grant was awarded in April 2014 to assist with the additional 12.5% remaining to cover the City's share of the construction costs. The City will be fronting the initial costs of construction and will file for reimbursement once the project is completed.

Council can eliminate the sales tax on food for home consumption, reduce it, make no change, or direct further staff work. Finance Director, Brent Worthington, Budget Manager, Mark Kahn and Revenue Manager, Jim Wedding presented this item and answered questions. **Councilor** 

Fogle moved to approve the ordinance reducing the tax on food for home consumption with the following amendment: in Section 1: 3.16.020 General Provisions A. There is imposed on the sale of tangible personal.....

"Notwithstanding anything in this sub-section A to the contrary, the sales tax on the sale of food for home consumption as defined in§ 39-26-102(4.5)(a), Colorado Revised Statutes, except candy and soda as defined in§ 39-26-707(1.5), Colorado Revised Statutes, is hereby reduced to a percent of the gross receipts as defined by the following timeline: from 3% to 2% effective November 1, 2015; from 2% to 1% effective November 1, 2016 and to eliminate all municipal sales tax on food for home consumption effective November 1, 2017." The motion was seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Clark.

Mayor Gutierrez asked for public comment at 9:32 p.m.: George Fitzgerald, 4760 Ignacio Ave, spoke in support of the ordinance; Ann Harroun, 2321 Apple Ave, spoke in opposition to a reduction or repeal of the sales tax on food for home consumption; Irene Fortune, 4830 Avon Ave; spoke in opposition to the ordinance; Buddy Meyers, 2429 Cameo Ct. spoke in support of the ordinance; Tom Buchanan, 910 W. 8<sup>th</sup> St, spoke in support of the ordinance, Terry Beard 3173 Sweetgum Ct, spoke in support of the ordinance, Nancy Rumfeldt, 2479 Selenium, encouraged Council to approve an ordinance abolishing the sales tax effective immediately; Larry Sarner, Ward II, encouraged Council to vote to repeal the tax effective immediately, Jackie Marsh, 243 E. 4<sup>th</sup> St. to tax users of tobacco, alcohol and marijuana to make up any impact from the loss of revenue with the approval of this ordinance. Jeremy Jerzvig, 3854 Buena Vista Dr, spoke in support of the ordinance. Mayor Gutierrez closed the public comment at 10:25 p.m. Council Discussion ensued. Council discussed the effective dates of the three step sales tax reduction. Consensus of Council was to make the effective date of each reduction November 1.

A roll vote was taken on the motion, which carried with all councilors present voting in favor thereof.

As a direct result of the action taken this evening, Consensus of Council was to direct staff to anticipate a discussion regarding the Priority Based Budgeting (PBB) model at the April 14, 2015 study session.

### TITLE:

An Ordinance on Second Reading Amending Title 15.04 Concerning Fire Code Appeals

#### **RECOMMENDED CITY COUNCIL ACTION:**

Adopt the ordinance as written on second reading.

#### **OPTIONS:**

- 1. Adopt the action as recommended.
- Deny the action. If the action is denied, then the Fire Rescue Advisory Commission retains the responsibility for hearing appeals. This is a role some current members are not comfortable with performing because they do feel it is consistent with the advisory function of the board, and they did not feel they have the technical expertise for code interpretation.
- 3. Adopt a modified action (specify in the motion).
- 4. Refer back to staff for further development and consideration. This action was pulled from a previous City Council agenda based on the informal feedback received related to the perception that the Fire Chief serving on the appeals board did not reflect independent consideration on code interpretation issues. The Loveland Fire Rescue Authority (LFRA) Board reconsidered the membership and replaced the Chief with another LFRA board member. It is a LFRA Board recommendation. If this action is referred back, it would be placed on the April 29, 2015 LFRA Board meeting for additional consideration based on City Council concerns. Then it would come back to the City Council at their May 19, 2015 meeting. Referring this back to staff would delay the agreed upon strategic advancement of aligning the accountability for Loveland Fire Rescue Authority policy direction with the governing board currently responsible for that function.

#### SUMMARY:

This is a legislative action to consider an ordinance on second reading. On February 25, 2015, the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority (LFRA) Board voted to recommend to City Council that a new Fire Code Board of Appeals be established with LFRA Board members. The Fire Rescue Advisory Commission currently serves in this capacity (per Loveland Municipal Code 15.04.150). The Fire Authority Board recommends that the Appeals Board be comprised of at least three LFRA Board

members, provided that one of the members present is from the Rural District. This ordinance was approved unanimously on first reading by Council at the March 17, 2015 regular meeting.

#### BACKGROUND:

Title 15 of the Municipal Code designates the Appeals Board to hear appeals if a person is denied a permit, has a permit revoked, is issued an Order to Correct or Abate, or is issued a Stop Work Order by the fire code official.

The Fire Rescue Advisory Board has heard only one appeal since its inception, based on records available. During the appeal process, the Commission members expressed concern about the difficulty of this quasi-judicial role as a citizen advisory board, where the primary responsibility of the commission is advising City Council on policy issues. The interpretation of fire codes was deemed technical in nature by the Commission and many of them felt unable to interpret with their limited background.

The LFRA Board considered a couple of options (the Fire Chief serving as the final appeal and the LFRA Board serving as the final appeal). They voted to recommend that the Appeals Board be comprised of a quorum of the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority Board, three Board members provided that one of the members is a Rural District member. The Board felt it was important to include appeals board members that would be considered independent by the appellant.

The appellant's recourse after the Appeals Board would be to take the matter to District Court, which has not changed.

### AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 15.04 CONCERNING FIRE CODE APPEALS

**WHEREAS**, On August 19, 2011, pursuant to an intergovernmental agreement between the City of Loveland ("City") and the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District ("District"), the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority ("Fire Authority") was created as a separate governmental entity with a beginning operational date of January 1, 2012 at 12:01 a.m.; and

**WHEREAS,** the Fire Authority, through the Fire Chief or his authorized designee, is responsible for enforcing the fire code as adopted by the District and the; and

**WHEREAS**, the city's Fire Rescue Advisory Commission ("FRAC") was designated as the appeal board for appeals of the fire code official's determinations, with final review by city council; and

**WHEREAS**, the FRAC has heard only one appeal since its inception, based on records available and during that one appeal, the Commission members expressed concern about the difficulty of this quasi-judicial role for members of as a citizen advisory board, whose primary responsibility is advising City Council on policy issues; and

**WHEREAS**, the Fire Authority board discussed the issue of interpretation of fire codes and appeals of the fire code official's determinations and voted at its February 25, 2015 meeting to recommend that the Fire Authority board be designated to hear final appeals and to conduct such appeals by appointing three members of the Board, one District and one City member of the board, together with one other member to act as hearing chair; and

**WHEREAS,** City Council desires to have the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority be designated as the final appeals board for hearing appeals of the fire code official's determinations and orders.

# NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOVELAND, COLORADO:

Section 1. That section 15.04.150 of the Loveland Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in full as follows:

#### 15.04.150 Appeals.

The construction advisory board shall serve as the board of appeals in connection with all codes adopted in this Title 15 by reference with the exception of appeals arising out of the fire code adopted by this Title.

Section 2. That section 15.04.152 of the Loveland Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in full as follows:

### 15.04.152 Appeals to Loveland Fire Rescue Authority.

A. If under the fire code adopted by this Title 15 a person is denied a permit, has a permit revoked, is issued an order to correct or abate, or issued a stop work order by the code official, such person may appeal the code official's action to the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority appeals board by filing a written notice of appeal to the code official not later than fifteen days after the permit has been denied or revoked or fifteen days after the issuance of an order to correct or abate or stop work order, which notice shall specifically state the appellant's grounds for appeal.

B. The Loveland Fire Rescue Authority appeals board hearing appeals shall be comprised of three members of the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority board, one from the City, one from the Loveland Fire Protection District and one additional member to serve as hearing chair.

C. Each appeal will be heard at a public hearing. Notice of the public hearing shall be given at least fifteen days in advance by publication of a notice of the public hearing in a newspaper of general circulation in the city. At the appeal hearing, members of the public, the appellant and the LFRA staff shall be entitled to address the appeals board. The public hearing shall be recorded.

D. The Loveland Fire Authority appeals board may authorize the issuance of a denied permit or rescind the revocation of a permit, order to correct or abate, or a stop work order, and when doing so may designate and impose such conditions as it may reasonably determine to be justified under the circumstances only if the board determines the following:

1. That the denial of the permit, the revocation of the permit, order to correct or abate or the issuance of a stop work order is not justified under the applicable provisions of the fire code; or

2. That the alternative design, materials, or methods of construction proposed by the appellant are equivalent to those prescribed by the applicable fire code provisions concerning quality, strength, effectiveness, fire resistance, durability, safety and all other pertinent factors and adequately protect the health safety or welfare of the occupant, intended occupants, surrounding properties and the public generally; or

3. That the applicable requirements of the fire code would work an undue and unique hardship upon the appellant. An appeal based on undue hardship must also include a statement from the appellant specifying the nature and extent of the hardship;

4. And, that the issuance of the denied permit or the rescission of the revocation of a permit, order to correct or abate, or stop work order will not unreasonably jeopardize the health,

safety and welfare of the occupant, intended occupants, surrounding properties and the public generally.

Section 3. That section 15.04.153 of the Loveland Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in full as follows:

## 15.04.153 Public hearings.

Every appeal under Section 15.04.151 and Section 15.04.152 shall be heard by the construction advisory board at a public hearing. Notice of the public hearing shall be given at least fifteen days in advance by publication of a notice of the public hearing in a newspaper of general circulation in the city. At the appeal hearing, members of the public, the appellant and city staff shall be entitled to address the appeals board. The public hearing shall be recorded.

Section 4. That section 15.04.155 of the Loveland Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in full as follows:

## 15.04.155 Review by City Council.

The appellant or the city official whose decision was appealed under Section 15.04.151 to the construction advisory board, and who is aggrieved by the decision of the appeal board, may appeal that decision to the city council. In addition, the Fire Chief may appeal a decision of the construction advisory board reasonably related to a fire related issue. A person appealing a decision of the construction advisory board shall file a written notice of appeal with the city's building official no later than fifteen days after the board's decision and shall in the notice the grounds for appeal. In the event of such appeal to the city council, the powers and duties set forth in Section 15.04.151 shall be exercised by the city council, which shall conduct a new public hearing on the matter.

<u>Section 5.</u> That as provided in City Charter Section 4-9(a)(7), this Ordinance shall be published by title only by the City Clerk after adoption on second reading unless the Ordinance has been amended since first reading in which case the Ordinance shall be published in full or the amendments shall be published in full. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect ten (10) days after its final publication as provided in the City Charter Section 4-8(b).

Referring this back to staff would delay the agreed upon strategic advancement of aligning the accountability for Loveland Fire Rescue Authority policy direction with the governing board currently responsible for that function.

#### SUMMARY:

Note: A slight change was made in the title and enacting language of this ordinance after first reading, to clarify the intent. This in an administrative action to dissolve the Fire Rescue Advisory Commission. The Commission has played an important role in strategic planning and policy considerations. Since Loveland Fire Rescue Authority (LFRA) Board is responsible for setting policy of the Authority, the citizen advisory board that is responsible for bringing the citizen's perspective to policy considerations should be aligned with the decision-making authority. Therefore the LFRA Board voted on January 28, 2015 to make a recommendation to the Loveland City Council to dissolve the Commission as a City Commission. If the City Council approves that

## BACKGROUND:

When the Fire Authority was established, City Council added two positions to the seven-member commission for representation from the Rural District (Loveland Municipal Code Section 2.60.110(B)). The alignment of the Commission remained with City Council. This section of the Code specifically identifies the purpose of the commission as an advisory body to the City Council and to the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority in the implementation of the fire protection master plan and the future strategic planning for the City and the Authority. In addition, the Commission serves as an advisory body to the Fire Chief concerning fire protection, rescue, and emergency management issues.

The ordinance attached would revise the Loveland Municipal Code. Because the Municipal Code Section 15 also designates the Fire Rescue Advisory Board as the Appeals Board the two actions need to be considered sequentially.

The LFRA Board voted to reinstate the Commission as an ad hoc commission. This would allow for them to invest their time specifically associated with project work (i.e. updating the Strategic Plan or the Rural District Mill Levy Strategy). If at some point in the future there is no project assignment, then meetings could be suspended. The mechanics of how this works would be approved by the LFRA Board as an addition to the Rules and Regulations document that identifies how LFRA administrative policies and procedures are handled.

**WHEREAS**, the City established a fire rescue advisory commission ("FRAC") to serve as a citizen advisory board to council and the Fire Authority and has played an important role in strategic planning and policy considerations; and

**WHEREAS**, since the Fire Authority board, is responsible for setting policy of the Authority, the citizen advisory board that is responsible for bringing the citizen's perspective to policy considerations should be aligned with the decision-making authority; and

**WHEREAS,** the Fire Authority board voted at their meeting on January 28, 2015 to make a recommendation to the Loveland City Council to dissolve the commission so that FRAC and all current members may be reappointed as an ad hoc commission to assist and advise the Fire Authority board;

**WHEREAS,** City Council desires to dissolve the FRAC as a City advisory board finding that it is better suited to be an advisory board to the Fire Authority.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOVELAND, COLORADO:

Section 1. That Loveland Municipal Code Section 2.60.110 is hereby repealed.

Section 2. That as provided in City Charter Section 4-9(a)(7), this Ordinance shall be published by title only by the City Clerk after adoption on second reading unless the Ordinance has been amended since first reading in which case the Ordinance shall be published in full or the amendments shall be published in full. City Council has directed staff to file a legal action quieting title to the building in the City and seeking removal of restrictions on use contained in the 1936 deed and a separate agreement. The restrictions include a limitation on the use of the building for "community purposes," restrictions concerning the wall shared with the church

immediately adjacent to the Pulliam Building, and a reversion clause requiring the building to revert to the school district in the event the City ceases to use the building for "community purposes."

This appropriation is for the total estimated cost of the quiet title action, which is being handled by the Wick & Trautwein Law Firm. Extensive research has been done to date identifying all of the parties that need to be named in the lawsuit. The cost of the litigation may be less if a settlement with the parties can be reached.

#### AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND ESTABLISHING THE LOVELAND DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY IN THE CITY OF LOVELAND, COLORADO

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Ordinance No. 5906, a special election was held in the City of Loveland, Colorado, on Tuesday, February 10, 2015, wherein the following question was submitted to the qualified electors entitled to vote thereon:

Shall the Loveland Downtown Development Authority be organized pursuant to Part 8, Article 25, Title 31, Colorado Revised Statutes to exercise all powers authorized therein within the boundaries of the area legally described in Ordinance No. 5906 of the City Council of the City of Loveland, Colorado, and generally described as follows:

The proposed DDA is generally bounded by northbound Lincoln Avenue and southbound Cleveland Avenue; the eastern boundary of the proposed DDA goes from the tip of the southern gateway, following Lincoln Avenue to 3<sup>rd</sup> Street SE, east 2 blocks to Washington Avenue, 6 blocks north to 4<sup>th</sup> Street, east one block to Adams Avenue, north to 5<sup>th</sup> Street, and then back west to Washington Avenue; then from the intersection of 5<sup>th</sup> Street and Washington Avenue, north one block and west one block to Jefferson Avenue, north 11/2 blocks and west another 1/2 block, then continuing northward, including the properties that front on Lincoln Avenue, toward Eisenhower Boulevard, to 1/2 block south of Eisenhower Boulevard, then east to Jefferson Avenue, north to the alley one half block past 16<sup>th</sup> Street, west 190 feet, north to the boundary with Lakeside Cemetery, west to Lincoln Avenue, north to the end of the one way system, and from the tip of the northern gateway, the western boundary includes the properties on the west side of Cleveland Avenue heading south to 11<sup>th</sup> Street, then west to just past the railroad tracks, south on Railroad Avenue for one block, and again west on 10<sup>th</sup> Street to Garfield Avenue, then south 11 blocks to past 2<sup>nd</sup> Street SW to the intersection of Garfield Avenue and Railroad Avenue, then following the irrigation ditch southeast back to Cleveland Avenue and then south to the end of the one way system.

**WHEREAS**, the returns of said election have been duly canvassed, and the Designated Election Official of the City of Loveland, Colorado, has determined that a majority of the qualified electors voting on said question cast ballots in favor thereof.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF

#### LOVELAND, COLORADO, THAT:

<u>Section 1.</u> <u>Creation of Loveland Downtown Development Authority</u>. There is hereby created and established pursuant to part 8 of article 25 of title 31, Colorado Revised Statutes, a downtown development authority in the City of Loveland, Colorado, to be known as the "Loveland Downtown Development Authority" (the "DDA").

<u>Section 2.</u> <u>Authority of DDA</u>. The DDA shall be a body corporate with all the purposes and powers now or hereafter authorized by Part 8 of Article 25 of Title 31, Colorado Revised Statutes, and all additional and supplemental powers necessary or convenient to carry out and effectuate the purposes and provisions of said Part 8.

**Section 3.** <u>Area of DDA</u>. The DDA shall exercise its powers within the area bounded as follows:

<u>Section 5.</u> <u>Actions by City Officers and Employees</u>. All actions not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance heretofore taken by the Designated Election Official of the City of Loveland, Colorado, or any other City officer or employee, directed towards the creation and establishment of a downtown development authority and the appointment of the board thereof, are hereby ratified, approved

and confirmed.

<u>Section 6.</u> <u>Severability</u>. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, or part of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall for any reason be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction invalid, such judgment shall not affect the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

<u>Section 7.</u> <u>Safety Clause.</u> The City Council finds and declares that this ordinance is promulgated and adopted for the public health, safety and welfare and this ordinance bears a rational relation to the legislative object sought to be obtained.

**Section 8.** Publication. As provided in City Charter Section 4-9(a)(7), this Ordinance shall be published by title only by the City Clerk after adoption on second reading unless the Ordinance has been amended since first reading, in which case the Ordinance or the amendments shall be published in full.

<u>Section 9.</u> <u>Effective.</u> This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect ten days after its final publication, as provided in City Charter Section 4-8(b).

#### TITLE:

An Ordinance on Second Reading Reducing the Sales Tax on Food for Home Consumption

#### **RECOMMENDED CITY COUNCIL ACTION:**

#### **OPTIONS:**

- 1. Adopt the action as recommended.
- 2. Deny the action. The sales tax on food for home consumption would remain in place at 3% of gross sales receipts.
- 3. Adopt a modified action. A modified action would require a new ordinance to be proposed at first reading at the next regular meeting of City Council.
- 4. Refer back to staff for further development and consideration.

#### SUMMARY:

At the March 24, 2015 special meeting, staff presented City Council with information pertaining to Loveland's sales tax on food for home consumption. At that meeting, City Council unanimously adopted an ordinance on first reading that reduced sales tax on food for home consumption over a three year period, with the tax being reduced to 2% effective November 1, 2015, 1% effective November 1, 2016 and such sales tax on the sale of food for home consumption is eliminated effective November 1, 2017. The total effect of the elimination of sales tax on food for home consumption is an approximate \$6.75 million per year, plus an annual growth rate of approximately 3.5%.

Sales tax on food for home consumption would comprise approximately \$6.3 million of General Fund revenue in 2016, with an annual growth rate of approximately 3.5% per year. Reducing or eliminating this sales tax would reduce the General Fund revenue by approximately \$335,000 in 2015; an additional \$2.08 million in 2016; an additional \$2.15 million in 2017; and an additional

\$2.19 million in 2018. The total reduction in General Fund Revenue in 2019, after full implementation of the elimination of sales tax on food for home consumption, would be approximately \$6.75 million per year, plus an annual growth rate of approximately 3.5%.

#### BACKGROUND:

Loveland has historically charged sales tax on food for home consumption, at the full City sales tax rate. Based on current estimates of sales of food for home consumption, the sales tax on food for home consumption equals approximately \$6 million, or 8% of General Fund revenue.

While food for home consumption is exempt from sales tax charged by the State of Colorado, there is no requirement that Colorado municipalities exempt food for home consumption. Elimination or reduction of sales tax on food will produce savings for Loveland households (as well as out-of-town households, who buy food in Loveland). It is estimated that the average savings per household would be about \$17 per month (while low income families, due to the availability of assistance programs, could save \$3-\$4 per month).

Eliminating or reducing the sales tax on food for home consumption would reduce General Fund revenue by up to 8% and by about \$6.3 million by 2017 under the stepped reduction proposed by this ordinance, with the tax being reduced to 2% effective November 1, 2015, and 1% effective November 1, 2016, and such sales tax on the sale of food for home consumption is eliminated effective November 1, 2017. Expense reductions to match lower revenues would need to be focused in those departments or activities which use General Fund money for support. Options will be developed for Council consideration and action as a part of the 2016 budget process.

# ORDINANCE NO.

# AN ORDINANCE REDUCING THE SALES TAX ON FOOD FOR HOME CONSUMPTION

**WHEREAS,** on August 7, 1984 the Loveland City Council adopted Ordinance No. 3094 that established a tax policy regarding sales and use tax and repealed and re-enacted Chapter 3.16 of the Loveland Municipal Code that, among other sales and use tax changes, set a tax rate of three percent (3%) on food for home consumption as defined in state statute, subject to approval by the City's registered electors on November 6, 1984; and

WHEREAS, City Council desires to reduce the sales tax on food for home consumption.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOVELAND, COLORADO:

Section 1. That sub-section 3.16.020 A. of the Loveland Municipal Code be amended as follows:

#### **3.16.020** General provisions.

A. There is imposed on the sale of tangible personal property at retail or the furnishing of services as provided in § 29-2-105(1)(d), Colorado Revised Statutes, a sales tax equal to three percent of the gross receipts (the "sales tax"). The tangible personal property and services taxable under this chapter shall be the same as the tangible personal property and services taxable pursuant to § 39-26-104, Colorado Revised Statutes, and subject to the same exemptions as those specified in § 39 -26 -114, Colorado Revised Statutes; provided that the exemption for the sales of food pursuant to § 39-26-707, Colorado Revised Statutes, exemption for sales of electricity, coal, wood, gas, fuel oil or coke sold to occupants of residences pursuant to § 39-26-114(1)(a)(XXI), Colorado Revised Statutes, and the exemption for sales of machinery or machine tools pursuant to § 39-26-114(11), Colorado Revised Statutes, shall not apply to the sales tax, and the sale of such items is expressly made taxable under this chapter. The imposition of the sales tax on individual sales shall be in accordance with schedules set forth in the rules and regulations promulgated by the city manager. Notwithstanding anything in this sub-section A to the contrary, the sales tax on the sale of food for home consumption as defined in§ 39-26-102(4.5)(a), Colorado Revised Statutes, except candy and soda as defined in§ 39-26-707(1.5), Colorado Revised Statutes, is hereby reduced 2% effective November 1, 2015,

and 1% effective November 1, 2016, and such sales tax on the sale of food for home consumption is hereby eliminated effective November 1, 2017.

<u>Section 2</u>. That as provided in City Charter Section 4-9(a)(7), this Ordinance shall be published by title only by the City Clerk after adoption on second reading unless the Ordinance has been amended since first reading in which case the Ordinance shall be published in full or the amendments shall be published in full. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon final adoption, as provided in City Charter Section 11-5(d).

The Water Transmission Line Replacement to Hwy 34 Project should be allocated as follows: 50% in the Water Fund and 50% in the Water SIF Fund. Between funds rolled over from 2013 and supplemental appropriations done in 2014, the percentage split for the budget between the Water Fund and the Water SIF fund is off slightly for these two projects. This ordinance addresses these corrections. The total amount of the appropriations are \$506,200 funded by transfers between the funds. There is no net increase in the total budget for either of the two projects.

#### BACKGROUND:

The 29<sup>th</sup> Street Pavement Reconstruction project from Wilson Avenue to Taft Avenue is approximately one-mile long and 65-feet in width. The contractor will be allowed to close half of the street at a time to do the work, maintaining a single lane of traffic in each direction during the project. In addition, they will be required to provide access to businesses and other parcels at all times.

The contractor will be tasked with removing the top portion of the existing asphalt surface; reworking the remaining asphalt and a portion of the underlying soil to a depth of 12-inches mixed with portland cement and performance of recompaction; and placing five inches of new asphalt surface.

The project construction is planned to begin in late April and to be substantially complete by the end of June, prior to the July 4<sup>th</sup> celebration. This schedule is weather dependent and may require adjustment based on weather delays.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The funding for Schedule AP shown below is budgeted in the annual Street Resurfacing Program and also in the Fort Collins–Loveland Airport maintenance budget.

The contract documents for the 2014 Street Resurfacing Program include a clause to allow the extension of the contract for up to three additional years in one-year periods, if beneficial to both parties. 2015 is the first extension year for the AP contract which covers asphalt paving and maintenance of City streets, cul-de-sacs and parking areas. In order to accept price increases, the Contractor is required to provide specific information to the City detailing changes in fixed costs associated with the required work. Cost increases are allowed for items that are out of the control of the Contractor (i.e. increases in the costs of raw materials and fuel for equipment). These contracts are especially sensitive to petroleum-related price increases. Using the provisions of the contract, the City was able to reach acceptable terms with Coulson Excavating Company with no increase to the 2014 unit prices.

**Schedule AP**: The work under the Schedule AP consists of the following: structural overlays to improve the durability of existing streets; reconstruction of failed pavement sections, either patching or replacement; and construction of new pavement sections such as turn lanes or completing partial roads to improve traffic operations. With a structural overlay, a two-inch asphalt lift is applied to the street surface. A structural overlay, with periodic minor maintenance, normally adds 9 to 12 years of life to a street. The project will also include reconstruction work on streets that have deteriorated beyond maintenance or for utility repair work. The existing pavement section is removed to a depth of four to eight inches and replaced with five to nine inches of asphalt. Reconstructed streets will normally last 15 to 20 years with only periodic minor maintenance (e.g. chip sealing).

Highlights of the Schedule AP include: resurfacing an estimated, 99,873 square yards of existing City roadway and reconstruction of 7,350 square yards of existing roadway at the Fort Collins-Loveland Airport.

The contract fee for the work included in Amendment Number Five is for \$153,311.31. The Airport's Council approved 2015 Budget contains the necessary appropriations for the expenditure for the contract and is reimbursable from an approved Colorado Department of Transportation Division of Aeronautics.

#### BACKGROUND:

The Airport has acquired over \$1 million in snow removal equipment over the past five years to satisfy FAA regulatory requirements for a commercial service airport. A building to store equipment has been in the Airport's Capital Improvement Plan since 1994. The equipment is located in various locations on the Airport including outdoor lots, and locations that could be revenue producing. Through long range planning efforts the Airport has been approved Federal and State resources in addition to design and construct this facility in 2015. #### **1 PROJECT DESCRIPTION**

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General. This is an Appendix attached to, made a part of and incorporated by reference with the Agreement between CH2M HILL, Inc. and The Cities of Fort Collins and Loveland, dated 05-14-2012, for professional services. This Scope of Services is Attachment A of Amendment #5 to the Contract. For the remainder of this scope of services, the Cities of Fort Collins and Loveland are collectively referred to as "Airport" and CH2M HILL, Inc. is indicated as "Consultant".

The work is to occur at the Fort Collins – Loveland Municipal Airport (FNL) in Loveland, Colorado. The project will be funded using a combination of funds from a Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Airport Improvement Program (AIP) grant and a State of Colorado (CDOT) Aeronautics grant to the Airport.

1.1 Construct Snow Removal Equipment Storage Building. The project consists of the preparation of cost estimates, design reports, construction plans, technical specifications, and contract documents to construct a Snow Removal Equipment (SRE) building near the existing airport fire station and offices, outside the Airport Operations Area (AOA) fence.

FNL currently has no dedicated facility for storing and maintaining SRE and other maintenance equipment. Their equipment is scattered around the airport property with some being kept in unused t-hangars and others being stored outside. Attached in Appendix A is a list of all the equipment the airport currently owns which will generally be used for building sizing. Everything on the list may not fit in the building so there may be a need for seasonal adjustment of what is stored inside. The primary equipment expected to be stored in the building includes the following:

- Loader
- Dump truck with plow x 3
- Sweeper
- Spray Truck
- Tractor/mower x 2
- Blower
- Passenger Pickup Trucks x 3

#### **Building Design Features**

1.1

- 1. Construction materials for the building will consist of a pre-manufactured steel building with rigid frame, metal siding insulated walls and roof, and standing seam roof.
- 2. Building doors will be sectional overhead doors at 16 foot high.
- 3. No Fire suppression system is anticipated but the requirement for the system will be determined during design.
- 4. No vehicle exhaust system. Building will have exhaust ventilation as required by building code. At least one exhaust fan on an outside bay will have automated control.
- 5. 8 foot high steel liner on the inside of the building.
- 6. The building heating will be infrared/radiant. The layout of heating units may be such that one bay can be controlled and heated separately once partitions are erected.
- 7. No interior walls or partitions will be designed/constructed.
- No restroom will be designed/constructed. Water and sanitary sewer utilities for a future restroom will be roughed in with the locations to be determined during design.
- 9. Utility connections to the building will be extended within enclosed connection from the existing fire station building and will include: Gas (for radiant heating), water (for vehicle washing and future restrooms), , electrical (for lighting and power, both 110V and 220V are needed). No communications connection will be designed/installed, however, spare ducts will be provided underneath driveways and between buildings to facilitate future connections.
- 10. No special security system or connection other than door locks are needed.
- 11. Driveway and building frontage pavement will be sized for pull-in and exit of single vehicles and will not be sized for vehicles with pull-behind attachments.
- 12. The building will have gutters and downspouts connected to storm drainage.
- 13. Access between the building and the fire station will be via a enclosed connection between the two buildings. The connection will not have stairs
- 14. The existing fuel tank southwest of the fire station may be moved to an alternate location as part of the project.
- 15. Concrete aprons will be designed at the vehicle entrances and exits. On the west side the apron will be 20 feet wide and on the east side it will be 5 feet wide.
- 16. No vehicle parking will be incorporated around the building.
- 17. Entry and exist widths of driveways to and from the building do not need to accommodate two-way traffic.
- 18. Building will have trench drains at the overhead doors and these will drain to an oil/water separator outside the building which will be connected to the sanitary sewer main.

#### **3** SCOPE OF SERVICES

**3.2.6** This contract will be lump sum contract and the Consultant's fee proposal will be reviewed and approved based on an Independent Fee Estimated (IFE) in accordance with FAA AC 150/5100-14D.

#### 4 DETAILED DESIGN PHASE

1.8

The Consultant shall prepare detailed designs of the building and site plans identifying new structures, renovations and site improvement issues.

#### 4.1 Existing Conditions and Site Survey

This task consists of identifying existing conditions and criteria for fully developing the site selected for the facility.

- a. Survey the site: Perform a site survey establishing grades, utilities, and surrounding amentias. The Consultant will subcontract the Survey work to Critigen, Inc. The detailed Survey scope of services and the proposal from Critigen is included in Appendix B.
- b. Conduct geotechnical investigation at the project site. The investigation will include a geotechnical report based on soil borings and pavement cores. Laboratory tests shall also be carried out on recovered soil samples to aid soil classification and determination of pertinent engineering properties. This will establish structural requirements for foundation and pavement designs. The Consultant will subcontract the Geotechnical work to Kumar and Associates. The detailed Geotechnical scope of services and the proposal from Kumar is included in Appendix B.
- c. Develop Pavement Designs for access roads and building driveway pavements.
- d. Utility Analysis: Contact existing utilities and determine capacity and needs for the proposed Maintenance and Storage Facility.
- **4.2 Design Development Phase (65%)**This phase begins the architectural and engineering design of the facility and the development of the detailing that will allow for bidding of the work. The plans and drawings prepared under this task shall be sufficiently detailed to define the construction of the individual spaces for the approved site plan and building layouts.
  - **4.2.1** Architecture, Foundation and Mechanical, Electrical and Plumbing Design. -The Consultant will subcontract the Architecture, Foundation and Mechanical, Electrical and Plumbing (MEP) design work to Van Sant Group (VSG). It is the responsibility of the supervising Land Surveyor (Surveyor) to ensure that all work under this agreement complies with all state and local regulations. All documents submitted shall bear the surveyor's seal, signature, and a certificate that all work was done under the surveyor's supervision and that all information contained in the document is true and is accurately shown.

The Sub-consultant shall take all reasonable precautions to prevent damage to public and private property, and shall restore the site to the condition existing prior to the sub-consultant's entry.

#### Horizontal/Vertical Datum Requirements

Construction control surveys performed with conventional instruments shall conform to Second Order, Class I for horizontal and vertical as described in Appendix A of Part 4. Elevations of all set control monuments will be generated from a closed and adjusted differential level loop beginning and ending at a primary or secondary control point with each monument being turned through. Kumar & Associates, Inc. is pleased to submit this proposal to conduct a geotechnical engineering study for the proposed snow removal equipment (SRE) building to be constructed near the southeast corner of Earhart Road and Pitts Drive at the Fort Collins-Loveland Airport in Loveland, Colorado. The proposed SRE building will be located south of the existing Airport Office and Fire Station and will have an approximate footprint of 80 feet by 100 feet. We assume that the proposed building will have a finished floor elevation near the existing ground surface.

We have previously performed a geotechnical engineering for the project site and presented our recommendations under our Project Number 02-3-137 dated December 26, 2002. The building orientation has been modified from the original study; however, the two borings drilled for that study fall within the currently proposed building footprint. We have been requested to review the previous study and drill two additional borings in or near the proposed building footprint to reevaluate the recommendations presented in the original study. A major change between the proposed structures is that the original study was developed with the proposed building being an addition that could withstand a limited amount of differential settlements. The currently planned structure is a free-standing building that can tolerate a slightly greater amount of movement; however, we will develop the most economical foundation recommendations that will limit total movements (heaving or settling) to about 1-inch or less.

We have also been requested to drill two additional exploratory borings to explore possible borrow sources south of the proposed building. One boring will be located approximately 125 feet east and 130 feet north of the intersection of Grumman Street and Pitts Drive. The other boring will be located approximately 200 feet east and 800 feet south of the intersection of Aviator Avenue and Stearman Street.

In addition to the exploratory borings, we have been requested to core the existing pavement surface near the existing building at two separate locations.

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6. Prepare a report summarizing the site exploration data and laboratory test results and providing our conclusions and recommendations. Measurements and photographs of the pavement cores will be provided in the report. The field work and report preparation will be supervised by a registered professional engineer.

#### TITLE:

Investment Report for February 2015

#### **RECOMMENDED CITY COUNCIL ACTION:**

This is an information only item. No Council action is required.

#### SUMMARY:

The budget projection for investment earnings for 2015 is \$1,759,080. On the portfolio's beginning balance this equates to an annual interest rate of 0.84%. For February, earnings of \$94,694 were posted to City funds. Interest rates rose in February, reversing the unrealized gain in January to an unrealized loss of \$532,192. Based on the monthly statement, the estimated annualized yield in February on the securities held by US Bank was 1.06%. Due to draws from fund balances to pay for the cost of scheduled capital projects, flood response, and project repair, the portfolio is about \$8 million lower than December 2013 and \$26.8 million lower than the pre-flood peak.

#### BACKGROUND:

At the end of February the City's portfolio had an estimated market value of \$203.8 million, about \$2.6 million less than a month ago. Of this amount, US Bank held \$189.7 million (including accrued interest) in trust accounts; other funds are held in local government investment pools, in operating accounts at First National Bank, and a few other miscellaneous accounts. Interest rates trended to all-time record lows in 2012-2013 before rising in the second half of 2014. After a sharp drop in January, interest rates came back up in February. Short-term rates are projected to rise starting around the middle of 2015. City investments are in US Treasury Notes, high-rated US Agency Bonds, highly-rated corporate bonds, money market accounts, insured certificates of deposit and local government investment pools. The City's investment strategy emphasizes safety of principal, then sufficient liquidity to meet cash needs, and finally, return on investment. Each percent of earnings on the portfolio equates to about \$2 million annually.

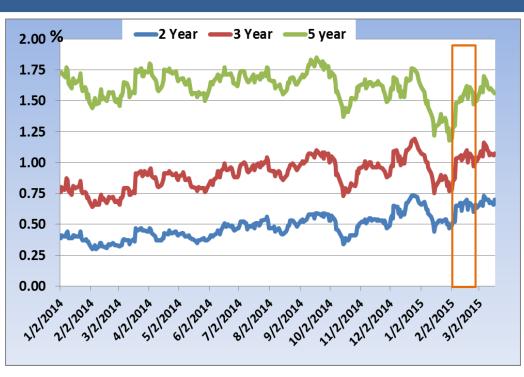

# Monthly Investment Report Treasury rate trends / Negative rates



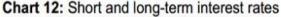

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When rates rise, the price of securities held in the portfolio decreases, resulting in a larger unrealized loss at month end.

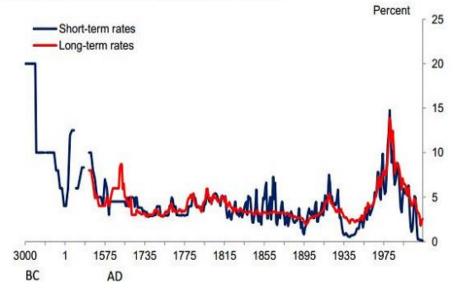

"We are living through an economic experiment, and this alone imposes significant uncertainty as to the outlook for the global economy. If history is our guide to the future, then we are flying blind.

However if there is one thing that is certain, it is the limited policy flexibility available to respond to the next crisis. This should make us all concerned."

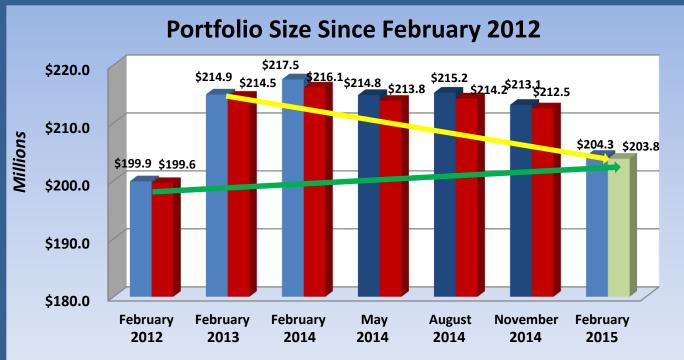

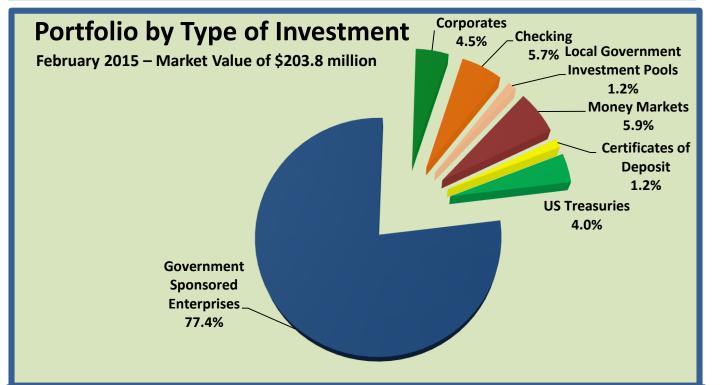

Blue bars show Purchase value; red or green bars show Market value (red = loss and green = gain).

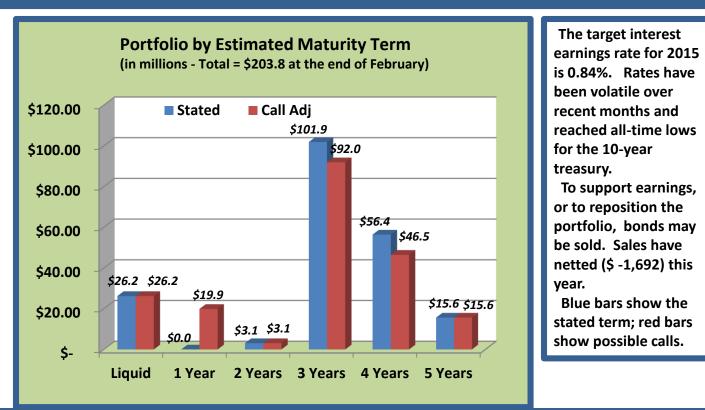

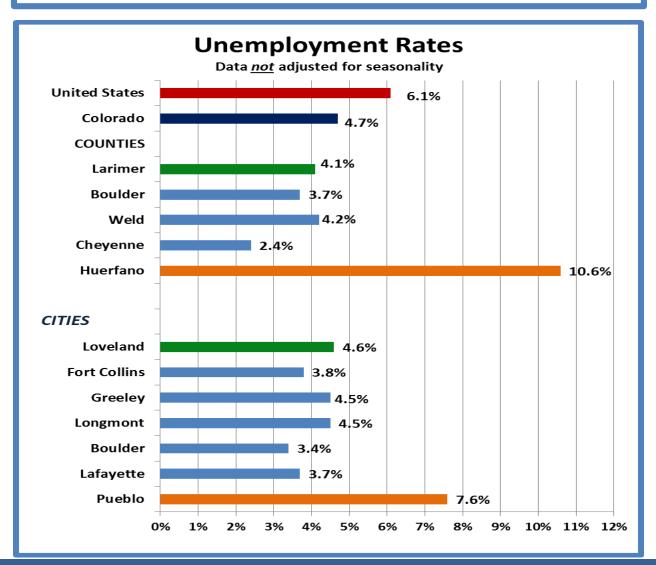

Updated Colorado Labor Data – Major Revisions from the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment

 Loveland's unemployment rate rose in January, up 1.1 percent from December.
 Compared to January of 2014, the unemployment rate decreased by 1.2%.

Important note: It is a routine practice at the beginning of each year for the Bureau of Labor Statistics to revise estimates for prior years based on new information available and updated methodologies. Revisions to the unemployment rate and all related household survey based series as a result of the benchmark process this year were particularly significant due to a change to American Community Survey based inputs. All series were revised back to 1976.



#### Current "missing worker" estimates at a glance

Updated March 6, 2015, based on most current data available.

Total missing workers, February, 2015: 5,970,000 Unemployment rate if missing workers were looking for work: 9.0% Official unemployment rate: **5.5%** 

In today's labor market, the unemployment rate drastically understates the weakness of job opportunities. This is due to the existence of a large pool of *"missing workers"*—potential workers who, because of weak job opportunities, are neither employed nor actively seeking a job. In other words, these are people who would be either working or looking for work if job opportunities were significantly stronger. Because jobless workers are only counted as unemployed if they are actively seeking work, these "missing workers" are not reflected in the unemployment rate. When persons marginally attached to the labor force plus those employed part time for economic reasons are added to the official unemployment rate (the 5.5% number above right), the rate rises to **11.0%** (the seasonally adjusted U-6 number; the unadjusted number is **11.4%**).

#### **Future Scan**

- Economists React to the Fed's March Statement: 'No Longer Patient, But Definitely Not Impatient, Yet' The Federal Reserve dropped a pledge to remain "patient" before starting to raise interest rates, but trimmed its outlook for growth inflation and unemployment.
  - "Markets and the FOMC are now squarely in a data-watching mode. If inflation stabilizes and then begins to drift higher while the labor market maintains its momentum and other economic indicators firm up after a very difficult winter, then June liftoff could well be in the cards. However, stable to lower inflation, lack of follow-through on the wage front, and/or disappointing aggregate growth could easily convince the Fed to remain on hold for longer than that. Whenever it begins, we think that the tightening cycle is going to be a very gradual one, and that the pace indicated by the FOMC's 'dots' is a reasonable one given a need to balance underlying economic and financial fragility with a need to wean markets and economies off of unsustainably low interest rates and to give monetary policy scope for easing at some stage in the future." –Joshua Shapiro, MFR (Source: Economists React to the Fed's March Statement: 'No Longer Patient, But Definitely Not Impatient, Yet', by Sarah Portlock in THE WALL STREET JOURNAL online, March 19, 2015.)

#### George K. Baum – "Treasury yields fell following the FOMC meeting on Wednesday."

- > While the Fed removed the word "patience" from their comments on the timing for the first interest rate increase, they still maintained a more dovish tone.
- The Fed needs to be confident that inflation will rise above 2% before they begin raising rates. The current buzz is that the first rate increase could come sometime between June and September.
- The Fed will continue to assess the potential decline in US exports and poor wage growth, as other central banks have implemented easing measures.
- Investor demand [for municipal bonds] surged following the FOMC meeting, driving yields lower by 20 basis points on the 10-year 'AAA' MMD and 18 basis points lower on the 30-year 'AAA' MMD. (Source: Tax-Exempt Bond Market Commentary, Week of March 20, 2015, George K. Baum & Company)
- The January 2015 Colorado Employment Situation was released March 17<sup>th</sup>. Employers added 3,700 nonfarm payroll jobs from December to January; the Labor Force increased by 3,500. The latest household survey data show Loveland's unemployment rate to be 4.6%, much higher than December. Other cities and counties show similar results. The chart with other cities and counties is on page 6. (Next Update 3/27.) (Source: Colorado Department of Labor and Employment January 2015 Colorado Employment Situation, March 17, 2015.)
- Recession Outlook: Four indicators (Industrial Production, Nonfarm Employment, Real Personal Income, and Real Retail Sales) are the basis for determining a recession. Based on February data, Industrial Production rose by 0.09%; January Real Retail Sales fell by 0.13%; and, February Employment continued on its 0.21% growth trend. Real Income was up 0.66% in January. The average is +0.21%. "The overall picture of the US economy had been one of slow recovery from the Great Recession with a clearly documented contraction during the winter of 2013-14, as reflected in last year's GDP for Q1 of last year. In April we'll get our first peak at Q1 2015 GDP. Preliminary data suggests that we'll see renewed finger pointing at the weather. The Big Four average in recent months suggests that the economy remains near stall speed." (Source: Advisor Perspectives, Doug Short, March 16, 2015.)

Council approved all of the projects included in the ordinance as a part of the 2014 Budget. The ordinance is organized by fund, with revenues and line item appropriations within each fund shown.

This is an annual appropriation ordinance staff brings to Council. The total projected cost of a project is appropriated in the first year a project is funded. This allows Council and the public to see what the total project will cost and that resources are available to fund the entire project at the time the project is initially budgeted.

State law and the City Charter state that all appropriations cease on December 31, the final day of the fiscal year. Capital projects, by their nature, take more than one fiscal year to complete for a variety of reasons. This requires the reappropriation of the funding that was not spent on the projects in the prior year in order to make funding available to complete the projects.

Gross appropriations, the sum of the total appropriations for each fund, total \$76,982,447. With the exclusion of the transfers between the various funds; the net appropriation in the ordinance is \$62,511,054.

Gross revenue, the sum of the total of funding sources for each fund, total \$82,759,795. With the exclusion of transfers between the various funds; the net source of funding is \$68,312,402 consisting of \$47,190 of contributions revenue, and \$68,265,212 of fund balance.

75.75% of the total net appropriation is in ten projects or programs:

Water Treatment Plant Phase II Expansion; The Transportation Program; Wastewater Treatment Plant Digester System Improvements; 2013 Flood Response (operations & maintenance); Police Records Management System; Waterline Replacements; Mehaffey Park; Open Lands Flood Renovation; Power Enterprise System Improvements; and 2015 CIPP Sewer Rehabilitation

The following is a detailed breakdown of projects and their corresponding funding sources. The first section is individual projects that exceed \$1,000,000. The second section contains all remaining projects. Both sections are listed in descending order by amount.

#### SUMMARY:

This is an administrative action. Since the adoption of the 2015 Budget, several issues have emerged that require increased appropriations. This ordinance addresses those issues. The total amount of appropriation is \$719,728 funded primarily by available fund balance.

Nearly all of the appropriation is funded by fund balance reducing the flexibility to fund future projects.

#### BACKGROUND:

Since the adoption of the 2015 Budget, there are several issues requiring additional appropriations. The projects are described below.

In the General Fund:

- Cultural Services Department received donations or sponsorships for three events: (1) \$10,000 is appropriated for the O'Keeffe Exhibit (2) \$1,200 is appropriated for Poet Laureate and (3) \$500 is appropriated for "History Days"
- Library Department received donations in 2014; earnings from the Gertrude Scott Trust, donations totaling \$27,386 and additional State grant funds of \$15,602 appropriated for books, materials and operating supplies.
- Public Works Facilities Division The cost of operating expenses for Fire Station 2 and the Service Center were not budgeted for in 2015. \$293,480 for Fire Station 2 and \$76,560 for the Service Center are appropriated for operating costs.

In the Fire Capital Expansion Fee Fund:

• \$295,000 from fund balance is appropriated for the Training Center Property Design

Section 1. That reserves in the amount of \$422,892 and revenues in the amount of \$1,836 in the General Fund 100, revenues in the amount of \$10,295 in the Recreation Capital Expansion Fee Fund 261, reserves in the amount of \$295,000 in the Fire Capital Expansion Fee Fund 264, revenues in the amount of \$7,354 in the Library Capital Expansion Fee Fund 266, and revenues in the amount of \$26,475 in the General Government Capital Expansion Fee Fund 268 totaling \$763,852 are available for appropriation. A portion of these are hereby appropriated in the amounts of \$424,728 in the General Fund and \$295,000 in the Fire Capital Expansion Fee Fund totaling \$719,728 for new projects programs and transferred to the funds as hereinafter set forth.
