2.3. PUBLIC WORKS 287 CURVE NEIGHBORHOOD TRAFFIC SAFETY IMPROVEMENT

In response to ongoing and repeated resident concerns, staff has worked closely with residents living on southbound US287 adjacent to the curve where 287 becomes one-way Cleveland Avenue for the past 15 months. In order to support increased traffic safety and provide an additional measure of protection for concerned residents, supplemental funding of \$150,000 to construct currently unbudgeted safety improvements (barriers and guardrail) is requested. The proposed project, as approved by the residents, extends the existing west side barrier wall southward approximately 160' and also installs ironwood barrier across the frontage of five residential properties located along the east side of the roadway. If approved, the schedule for construction of the improvements would be the summer 2017. The design and public outreach portions of the project have been completed. CDOT acceptance of the proposed design has been secured. The current unassigned balance in the Excess TABOR fund is \$13,557,812. If the request is approved, the remaining unassigned fund balance in the Excess TABOR fund will be \$13,407,812. This item was approved unanimously on first reading at the January 17, 2017 City Council meeting.

2.4. FINANCE INITIAL PROJECTS RE-APPROPRIATION CITYWIDE

Budget Office staff worked with City departments to identify remaining balances related to on-going projects appropriated but not completed in 2016 that need to be re-appropriated for continuation in 2017. Included in this ordinance are remaining balances for capital or one-time projects. equipment purchases, or contracts that were originally budgeted in 2016, but not completed by year-end, that are recommended for reappropriation in 2017. Unspent appropriation related to these items reverted to the fund balance of origin at the end of 2016 and is available for re-appropriation in 2017. Gross re-appropriations, the sum of the total re-appropriations for each fund, total is \$85,763,595. The net reappropriations, excluding \$10,110,182 in transfers made between the various funds, total is \$75,653,413. Transfers are excluded to avoid double counting of related appropriation line items (transfer and corresponding expenditure) included in the ordinance. This item was approved unanimously on first reading at the 1/17/17 City Council meeting.

2.5. FINANCE PUBLIC COMMENT SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION FOR BUDGET SOFTWARE SOLUTION

The City's budget process is very manual and involves the use of a multitude of spreadsheets and other documents that serve different purposes throughout the process. Larimer County recently conducted a competitive bidding process and selected a budgeting software solution offered by PowerPlan Corporation. Finance and IT Department staff received a demonstration of this solution and believe it to be a great fit for the City. In addition to automating existing business processes, it would provide opportunities to improve and enhance processes. Thus, staff would like to leverage Larimer County's competitive bidding process and contract with PowerPlan to purchase and implement a budgeting software solution. The one-time implementation cost is \$114,388 (including the first year of maintenance and support and internal technology costs) with on-going annual maintenance and support costs of \$16,280 (for years two and three) and \$17,100 (for years four and five), for a total five-year cost of ownership of \$181,148. Staff would like to purchase, implement, and provide training on this system by the end of 2017 for broad use at the beginning of 2018 for the 2019 budget process. The current estimated General Fund Unassigned Fund Balance is \$5,807,097. If approved, the General Fund Unassigned Fund Balance would decrease by \$114,388 to \$5,692,709.

A Motion to Adopt on First Reading, An Ordinance Enacting A Supplemental Budget And Appropriation To The 2017 City Of Loveland Budget For The Purchase Of A Budgeting, Forecasting, Reporting, And Analysis Software Solution.

2.6. FINANCE PUBLIC COMMENT SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION FOR TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS

Three projects (2017 Supplemental Bridge Repairs, US 287 Sidewalk Installation, and US 287/US 34 Integration) were approved in the 2017 Capital Program. They were initially appropriated in the Capital Projects Fund, however, they should have been appropriated in the Transportation Fund to properly connect them to the Transportation Program. This ordinance transfers project funding for these three projects from the Capital Projects Fund to the Transportation Fund. Project funding is merely being shifted from one Fund to another Fund, with no bottom line impact to the budget.

2.7. PARKS AND RECREATION GRANT AGREEMENT WITH GOCO FOR NAMAQUA AVENUE UNDERPASS DESIGN

The Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO) awarded the City of Loveland a \$97,000 Connect Initiative Trail Planning Grant for the design and preparation of construction documents of an underpass at Namaqua Avenue, on the City of Loveland Recreation Trail. The new underpass would provide trail users with a safe, grade-separated crossing of an arterial roadway projected to double in volume by 2035. The grant agreement seeks reimbursement funds for the design of the underpass in 2018; Conservation Trust Funds will be requested for the 2018 budget cycle. The estimated cost for the design and preparation of construction documents is \$130,350. The City shall provide \$33,350 in matching funds, per the grant agreement and cover any amounts over the estimated cost for engineering and design. The Resolution approves the grant agreement, which is required by GOCO in 2017 for grant approval. The grant funds of \$97,000 and the local match of \$33,350 will be appropriated in the 2018 budget, Conservation Trust (Lottery) Fund 029.

2.8. PUBLIC WORKS
WASTESHED PLANNING STUDY PHASE II IGA

This is an administrative action. This Resolution authorizes the City Manager to execute an IGA between the City and the County for \$20,000 to assist in the cost of the Phase 2 Wasteshed Study. Funds will be available in the Solid Waste Enterprise Fund if approved by Council upon Second Reading on February 7, 2017 as this appropriation was included in Budget 2016-to-2017 Rollover/Reappropriation Request.

A Motion To Adopt Resolution #R-8-2017 Approving An Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) For Regional Wasteshed Planning Study (Phase 2).

2.9. PUBLIC WORKS VANGO VEHICLE MAINTENANCE SERVICES NFRMPO IGA

Current VanGoTM maintenance services are provided to participants through NFRMPO IGAs with

the cities of Fort Collins and Greeley. Recently, Fort Collins moved van maintenance services from south Fort Collins to the northern edge of the city. Additionally, the NFRMPO developed an agreement with CDOT to provide a vanpool option for Estes Park during the canyon construction project. Due to these factors, the NFRMPO requested that the City of Loveland enter into an IGA to provide van maintenance services for an initial 24 VanGoTM vehicles with the potential to increase that number to 40. Providing this option requires the addition of 1.00 FTE Service Technician at an estimated cost of \$60,000 plus an additional \$30,000 for equipment and supplies, for a total of \$90,000, \$30,000 for half of the Service Technician cost would be reimbursed by the NFRMPO through a flat monthly rate. Additionally, it is estimated that another \$30,000 would be reimbursed by the NFRMPO for estimated additional actual charges. An ordinance approving a supplemental budget and appropriation for these costs was adopted unanimously by City Council on second reading on January 17, 2017. The purpose of this resolution is to have City Council approve the Intergovernmental Agreement and authorize the City Manager to sign the Agreement. A majority of expenses will be reimbursed by the NFRMPO. The remainder was previously included as part of the supplemental budget and appropriation ordinance approved on second reading on January 17, 2017.

A Motion To Adopt Resolution #R-9-2017 Approving An Intergovernmental Agreement Between The North Front Range Metropolitan Planning Organization (NFRMPO) And The City Of Loveland For Vehicle Maintenance Services.

All public hearings are conducted in accordance with Council Policy. When Council is considering adoption of an ordinance on first reading, Loveland's Charter only requires that a majority of the Council quorum present vote in favor of the ordinance for it to be adopted on first reading. However, when an ordinance is being considered on second or final reading, at least five of the nine members of Council must vote in favor of the ordinance for it to become law.

5.2. COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP OFFICE COUNCIL SUPPORT FOR LOVELAND HOUSING AUTHORITY AND HABITAT FOR HUMANITY FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN LOVELAND

Alison Hade, Community Partnership Office, introduced this item to Council. Cindy Warner, Executive Director for Habitat for Humanity and Sam Betters, Executive Director for the Loveland Housing Authority presented their respective programs to Council. During the July 12, 2016, Study Session on Affordable Housing, City Council requested a Resolution recognizing the Loveland Housing Authority and Loveland Habitat for Humanity as partners to the City of Loveland in providing

affordable housing and to recognize the two local organizations as preferred providers of affordable housing in the City. A Resolution recognizing the Loveland Housing Authority and Loveland Habitat for Humanity as official partners and preferred providers of Affordable Housing does not commit specific funding for a project. Pubic Comment: Howard Dotson spoke concerning homeless and those who are without shelter.

5.3. PARKS AND RECREATION & OTHER DEPARTMENTS PUBLIC COMMENT EMERALD ASH BORER SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION

Elizabeth Anderson, Parks and Recreation Director, introduced this item to Council. Leah Browder, Public Works Director, addressed the street ash trees and a proposal on removal, disposal, replacement, and a treatment plan. Including an overview of a draft Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) Management Plan in preparation for the impending arrival of the EAB in Loveland (projected to be this year due to the discovery of EAB in Longmont in June 2016). The City's Plan is modeled after Plans developed by Boulder County and the City of Longmont. EAB is a highly destructive, non-native insect that infests and rapidly kills all North American true Ash species leaving them dry, brittle and highly hazardous. EAB is a regulated pest meaning that federal and state entities require local action upon detection including quarantine, heightened monitoring and special handling of wood waste. The Borer has swept westerly across the country since entering the US on the east coast in the 90's and has now been found in Boulder (2013) and Longmont (2016). The City has completed a parks tree inventory including 2,742 Ash trees. Tree inventory for golf courses and natural areas is continuing. The inventory and assessment of City-owned street trees is about 75% complete. The initial data indicates a projected total of approximately 15,000 City-owned street trees with 3,450 or 23% of the inventory being Ash. It is recommended that the City take the first steps to implement systematic Ash tree removal, replacement, and treatment as well as a public education effort during 2017. It is anticipated this will be the first year of a 10-year program with future vears to be included in upcoming years' budget proposals. The current

General Fund Unassigned Fund Balance is \$5,807,097. If this \$92,200 request is approved, the remaining General Fund Unassigned Fund Balance will be \$5,714,897.

Public Comment: John Ryan Keil expressed concern regarding the lack of bio-controls and using predator wasps. Bruce Croissant expressed concern over other types of diseases affecting other types of trees and helping citizens maintain their trees.

Krenning: Would like to use the affordable housing fund to address the problem.
