However, when an ordinance is being considered on second or final reading, at least five of the nine members of Council must vote in favor of the ordinance for it to become law.

4.2 FINANCE PUBLIC HEARING 2018 BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF LOVELAND

Theresa Wilson, Budget Manager and Matthew Elliott, Senior Budget Analyst, presented this item to Council. Joe Bernosky, Water and

Power Director, presented the Water and Power fees. Jeff Bailey. Public Works Engineer and Kevin Gingery, Stormwater Engineer, presented information on the stormwater fees. Julia Holland, Human Resources Director, presented information on the employee benefits fund. Bob Ticer, Police Chief, presented information on staffing officers for the downtown area. Brent Worthington, Finance Director, presented information on TABOR excess contributions. Leah Browder, Public Works Director, answered questions regarding HIP Streets Infrastructure Assessment. The purpose of this item is to establish rates, charges, and fees associated with the 2018 City of Loveland Budget. To establish the City's Mill Levy for 2017 (for property taxes collected in 2018), which remains unchanged over 2016. This purpose of this item is also to enact the 2018 City of Loveland Budget. The recommended 2018 total appropriations amount for City of Loveland Budget is \$350,028,367. This includes \$32,029,298 in interfund transfers. These appropriations will provide for the continuation of existing services levels and reasonable growth in critical service areas. The City ended 2016 with total assets of \$1,081,949,163 and total liabilities of \$74,246,287, ending the year with total net assets of \$1,007,702,876. Within the Governmental Fund types, revenues totaled \$129,385,461 and operating expenses totaled \$122,856,658, for a net operating revenue excess of \$6,528,803 (excluding transfers). The 2018 Budget was presented to City Council at Regular meetings and Study Sessions throughout 2017. The 2018 Budget was also presented at Citizens' Finance Advisory Commission meetings throughout 2017. In-depth details are provided in the AIR under Council or Board/Commission Review. The Citizens' Finance Advisory Commission voted unanimously to endorse the 2018 Budget Process at their September 13, 2017 meeting.

Stormwater's financial plan is available on the City's website; it includes operation and maintenance of the projects.

Councilors expressed concern regarding the TABOR reserve fund and staff agreed to set up a separate reserve account fund in 2017. Staff will update the Financial Master Plan, which has some errors in it. Councilors discussed expenditures, performance measures, benefits plan, decision packages, goals, prioritizing, and other budgetary issues. Councilor Olson provided a spreadsheet he created to discuss concerns he had with the budget and the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR).

Staff will address Councils concerns and questions in a memo prior to the second reading of the budget on October 17, 2017.

Public Comment: Joyce Kilmer, Loveland resident, expressed concern regarding utility and water rate fees. Gary Lindquist, Loveland resident, expressed concern regarding utility fee increases and property taxes.

4.3. NORTHERN COLORADO REGIONAL AIRPORT PUBLIC HEARING 2018 BUDGET FOR THE NORTHERN COLORADO REGIONAL AIRPORT

Jason Licon, Airport Director, presented this item to Council. The City of Loveland provides support to the Airport through the Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with the City of Fort Collins, Colorado. As a part of this function, the City Council approves and appropriates the Airport budget, which includes the City's contribution to the 2018 Airport Budget. On July 20, 2017, the Northern Colorado Regional Airport Commission reviewed and recommended, for approval, the proposed 2018 Airport Budget to the Loveland City Council and the Fort Collins City Council. The 2018 appropriation for the Northern Colorado Regional Airport is \$1,576,500, which is \$1,015,832 or 39.2% less than the 2017 Adopted Budget amount of \$2,592,332. The key driver of this decrease is: 2017 had a \$993,774 increase in anticipated grant funding from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and the State of Colorado Department of Transportation for capital projects. Operations expenses of \$1,211,500 include funding for the Airport staff and day to day operating costs, funded through Airport generated revenues and contributions from the two cities. This amount is \$112,470 or 10.2% higher than the 2017 Adopted Budget amount of \$1,099,030. The capital program with recommended appropriations of \$365,000 to continue airport improvements is funded by grants from the FAA and the State of Colorado and Airport generated revenues, is \$1,128,302 or 75.6% lower than the 2017 Adopted Budget amount of \$1,493,302. This decrease is due to no anticipated FAA and State of Colorado grant funding availability for 2018. The City of Loveland's contribution is matched by the City of Fort Collins through an intergovernmental agreement between the Cities. The 2018 contribution amount from the City of Loveland for Airport operations is \$242,500, which is a \$17,500 or 6.7%

reduction from the 2017 contribution amount. The remainder of the Airport's funding is generated through Airport revenues and grant funding. This item was presented at a City Council Study Session held on September 12, 2017.

Discussion ensued regarding concern over attracting air carriers with subsidizing flights, collaborating with other airports, and other incentives.

4.4. LOVELAND FIRE RESCUE AUTHORITY 2018 LOVELAND FIRE RESCUE AUTHORITY BUDGET AND FEES

Mark Miller, LFRA Chief, presented this item to Council. The resolution provides for City Council approval of the LFRA schedule of rates, charges, and fees and 2018 Budget for 2018. The resolution provides approval of the LFRA schedule of rates, charges, and fees and 2018 Budget for 2018. There are no changes to LFRA's rates, charges, and fees for 2018. LFRA's total recommended 2018 appropriation is \$14,985,146. The City of Loveland's contribution of \$12,049,817 is included in the City's recommended 2018 Budget – this contribution amount is a 6.1% increase over 2017. The LFRA 2018 Budget was presented to the LFRA Sub-Committee on July 11, 2017 where the subcommittee expressed concerns over a few items in the budget. See attachment 3 for details. As a result of this meeting, Chairman Swanty, City Manager Steve Adams, and Chief Miller met on August 4, 2017 to discuss the increase in cost allocation. As such, LFRA was able to reduce the allocation by approximately \$60,000. The 2018 Budget was presented at the LFRA Board meeting held on August 30, 2017 where the Board approved the budget and fee schedule. This 2018 Budget was presented at the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District meeting on September 6, 2017 where the District approved the budget and fee

schedule. Last, this item was presented at the September 27, 2017 LFRA Board meeting where the Resolution was adopted unanimously. **Public Comments were not given.**

Theresa Wilson, Budget Manager, presented this item to Council. The City serves as the sponsoring agency for the Special Improvement District #1, and City Council acts as its ex officio Board of Directors. By State law, all special districts with a connection to the City must adopt a budget. The Board of Directors is responsible for adopting the annual budget for the District. These materials are needed for the adoption of the 2018 Budget for the District. The recommended 2018 appropriation of \$490,000 remains unchanged for 2018 compared to 2017. This continued appropriation level will promote continuation of existing services (infrastructure improvements) within the District. This item was presented at a City Council Study Session held on September 12, 2017. Public Comments were not given.

4.6. FINANCE PUBLIC HEARING 2018 BUDGET FOR THE LOVELAND URBAN RENEWAL AUTHORITY

City Council serves as the Board of Commissioners for the Loveland Urban Renewal Authority (LURA). By State budget law, the Authority must adopt a budget. The Board of Commissioners is responsible for adopting the annual budget for the Authority. These materials are needed for the adoption of the 2018 Budget for the Authority. The recommended 2018 appropriation of \$13,214,410 is an increase of 1.2% compared to 2017. This appropriation level will promote continuation of existing services (redevelopment and infrastructure improvements) within the Authority. The 2018 recommended appropriation for the Authority is \$13,214,410, which is a 1.2% increase over 2017. The appropriation is for redevelopment and infrastructure improvements within the boundaries of the Authority. Within the Downtown Project Area, \$10,000 is appropriated for developer reimbursements based on existing agreements. Within the Expanded Finley Project Area, \$80,000 is appropriated for payment of interest expenses for internal loans between LURA, Capital Expansion Fee (CEF) Funds, and the General Fund. Within the US 34/Crossroads Project area, the Master Financing Agreement Section 3.1.1.3 states \$40,000 is appropriated for City administrative costs, \$983,000 is appropriated to be paid to Thompson Valley Schools for building new schools, and \$12,051,410 is appropriated for the transfer of revenue collected within the US 34 Crossroads Project Area to the Centerra Metropolitan District #1 to meet contractual obligations between the Authority and the Centerra Metro District #1 – related to this, \$50,000 is appropriated to be paid to the General Fund for associated administrative charges. This item was presented at the City Council Study Session on September 12, 2017. Public Comments were not given.

2018 BUDGET FOR THE LOVELAND GENERAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT #1

Theresa Wilson, Budget Manager, presented this item to Council. City Council serves as the ex officio Board of Directors for the General Improvement District #1. The Board of Directors is responsible for adopting the annual budget for the District. These materials are needed for the adoption of the 2018 Budget for the District. The recommended 2018 appropriation of \$22,500 and associated property tax mill levy (2.684 mills) remain unchanged for 2018 compared to 2017. This continued appropriation level will promote continuation of existing services (parking lot repair and maintenance and landscape maintenance) within the District. The 2018 recommended appropriation for the District is \$22,500, which is unchanged over 2017. This funding is for parking lot repair and maintenance and landscape maintenance within the District. The 2017 Mill Levy applied to the 2017 Assessed Valuation determines the 2017 Property taxes. The 2017 property taxes are due and payable in 2018. This property tax revenue funds the 2018 Budget. This item was presented at the City Council Study Session held on September 12, 2017.
