Lynda.com’s vault opens for Loveland Public Library users

Want to be a video animator?

A PhotoShop wizard?

A Javascript web geek?

How about a songwriter or a banjo player?

Most people imagine lots of time, and buckets of money, are required to achieve most of those results, but not anymore.

The Loveland Public Library,

unveiling what Director Diane Lapierre calls “a gift to the community,” has thrown open a door to an online treasure chest of more than 6,300 video courses that put all the pursuits mentioned above and many more within reach.

A current library card and a computer or phone are the only tickets required to access Lynda.com and its hundreds of teachers who offer lively, engaging and multi-level instruction in subjects concentrated on business, software, technology and creative skills.

“I’m thrilled that we’re able

to offer Lynda.com classes to our customers,” Lapierre said. “It gives all our card holders access to a wealth of expert instruction on topics such as technology, design, photography and lots more.”

While geeks of all stripes will find a feast on Lynda, the catalog is full of surprises for the non-technical, too. A musician can master the fundamentals of the five-string banjo under the guidance of banjo impresario Tony Trischka. A second-grade teacher can explore the latest thinking on project based learning with Buck Institute pioneer

Dayna Laur, and aspiring comic book illustrators can learn the tricks of the trade with expert illustrator Ben Bishop.

Not your average online tutorial

The courses, which are developed and taught by recognized industry experts, are professionally produced, providing a superior online learning experience, not only for content, but also for image and sound quality, setting Lynda's courses apart from the myriad of other online tutorials. The platform also regularly updates its course content so that it is current, cutting-edge and relevant to today's learners of all ages.

Lynda's depth and breadth requires some time to assess: The thousands of individual courses are supported by 267,000 individual video tutorials. As if that weren't enough, the Lynda library also includes a collection of 106 film and video documentaries about thought leaders and entrepreneurs in the fields where instruction is concentrated.

The platform also offers versatility and convenience for users. In addition to accessing courses on the live website, users can download content to their own devices to view later, and there is a Lynda.com app. When signing up, users are asked about their interests. The platform responds with specific course recommendations and provides information on course length, the level of difficulty and a brief overview. Users have the ability to search for courses using keywords and can add specific courses to playlists they create.

Lynda.com is owned by the professional networking platform LinkedIn, following an acquisition two years ago that made founder

Lynda Weinman a dot-com billionaire. From its beginnings as a free training resource for Weinman's web developer students, the company evolved to bring users in through monthly memberships, and greatly expanded its number of course offerings and faculty.

Philosophy and approach remain

Though LinkedIn has assumed ownership and control, the philosophy and approach for developing and disseminating the content has remained largely the same, with an

emphasis on quality of instruction and variety of course offerings. While the site is available from the

library's homepage, current LinkedIn members can also access the platform with their LinkedIn logons, and add courses

they've taken to their LI profiles to boost their professional presence.

Loveland's ability to add Lynda was made possible through

its affiliation with the Flatirons Library Consortium, an association of northern Colorado libraries that have an agreement to share

resources. Joining the consortium allowed a shared purchase of the service that would otherwise be out of Loveland's

reach.

According to Amy Phillips, LPL's Adult Services Manager, this was something the library had been wanting to do for some time. "Patrons had asked about Lynda in the past," she said, "but it just wasn't possible. Joining Flatirons and making the investment in this exceptional learning tool is the library using the publics' tax dollars wisely to present this to the citizens of Loveland."

21st century skills - for free

The library will offer Lynda's 'Premium' version, which opens Lynda's entire catalog to users at no cost as long as they have a current library card. If users were to sign up independently, they would be paying nearly \$500, annually.

To sign up for Lynda, patrons with current library cards can go to www.lovelandpubliclibrary.org. A link to Lynda is available from the homepage. Residents wanting a library card can go to the front desk at the library. They must present a current I.D. and be a Colorado resident.

"We are very excited to be able to offer this fantastic new resource to our patrons. It's important for modern-day libraries to keep moving forward and offering materials and technologies that help people enrich and transform their lives. The addition of Lynda allows us to help people gain 21st century skills when it works for them without having to drop everything to attend a class," said Phillips.

Put the freeze on winter fires by following these important safety tips

According to the National Fire Protection Association, December and January are the peak months for the overall number of home fires, deaths and injuries.

Keep your family safe by following these important safety tips:

In the kitchen

- Keep pot handles turned inward to avoid accidental spills and burn injuries
- Avoid loose, baggy clothing that could catch fire or catch on pot handles
- Always keep combustibles away from stove tops and other heat sources

- Maintain a 3-foot no-play-zone around the oven and stove
- Never leave cooking unattended
- 'Put a lid on it' to extinguish cooking fires - do not use water.

The whole house

- Keep space heaters at least three feet away from combustible materials
- Keep candles in non-tip holders and away from children and pets



- Never leave burning candles unattended
- Keep matches and lighters out of reach of children
- Make sure you have working smoke alarms with fresh batteries on every level of the home
- Make sure to have a carbon monoxide detector if you have gas-fueled appliances
- Have your chimney inspected and cleaned by a professional at least once a year
- Be sure not to overload electrical outlets and ensure all cords are free

of damage

- Make sure to have a working fire extinguisher in your home and know how to use it
- Make sure all members of the household know how to dial 911 in case of emergency
- Create and practice an evacuation plan in case your family needs to leave the home quickly.



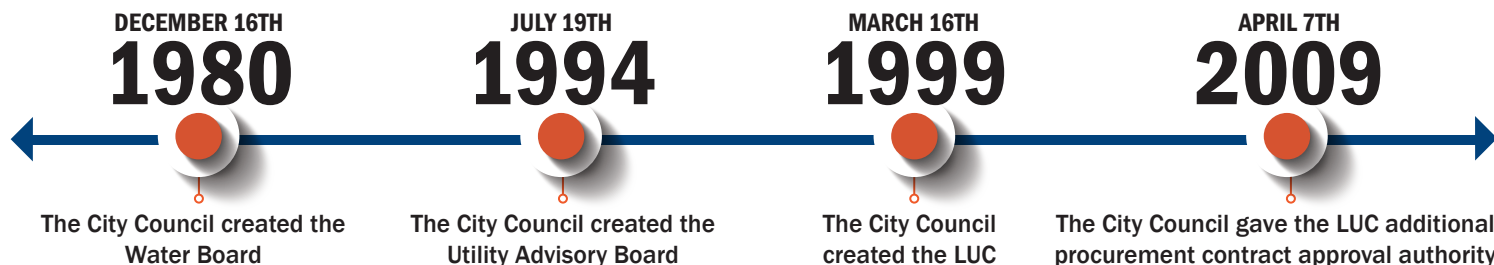

FINALIZE THE DESIGN AND BEGIN CONSTRUCTION ON THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT EXPANSION AND REHABILITATION PROJECT

The design is complete and construction is underway. Construction will continue through the first quarter of 2019. More information and time-lapse footage of the project can be found on www.cityofloveland.org/wwtpeexpansion.

COMPLETE CONSTRUCTION OF FOOTHILLS SUBSTATION

Construction is complete and the substation was energized on August 3, 2017 before the FEMA Alternate Project deadline on September 15, 2017. WATER LOSS AUDIT

Process improvements have been made to the methodology for calculating true system water loss and tracking various authorized but unbilled and unmetered water usage.

The project received the Corps of Engineers 404 permit and progress continues on preliminary design and property acquisitions. 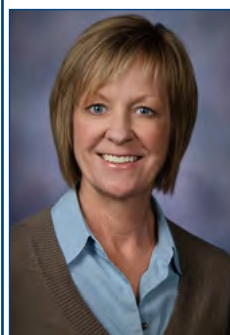
