### **Yard Waste Collection Services Have Begun**

Resident can expect these changes moving forward

As residents prepare yards for planting season and general maintenance, the City wants to inform residents of a few changes in what materials can be recycled in green yard waste carts.

The City of Loveland's composting partner, A1 Organics, no longer accepts shredded paper or paper yard waste bags through curbside collection service or in organic piles at the Recycling Center. However, residents can still bring shredded paper to the Recycling Center to be recycled.

We ask residents to do their part in this effort by knowing what is and is not accepted yard waste items. If the wrong items are included in the green yard waste carts, then the entire cart can't be recycled. The City has listed the items that will now be accepted and not accepted to meet these requirements. They are the following:



The city supplies three carts for yard waste, recycling and trash. Green yard waste carts must be purchased.



# **NASTE ITEMS**

These items do belong in green yard waste carts:

- ➤ Grass clippings
- ➤ Leaves
- > Flowers
- ➤ Garden trimmings
- > Branches and twigs less than 1-inch in diameter (trimmed to fit into yard waste cart) > Shredded paper, paper bags or other paper

### NOT ACCEPTED YARD WASTE ITEMS

These items do not belong in green yard waste carts and should be disposed of in other ways.

- > Dirt, pet waste and plastic bags
- ➤ Trash, rocks or metal
- ➤ Ashes (hot or cold)
- > Oversized logs, stumps or lumber
- materials (new for 2023)

### Loveland, Platte River owner communities pursue 100% non-carbon energy mix


In 1973, the communities of Loveland, Estes Park, Longmont, and Fort Collins created Platte River Power Authority (Platte River) - a not-for-profit, community-owned public power utility - to generate electricity for the region's power needs. Platte River has generated electricity for Loveland ever since, with a diverse generation portfolio that includes coal, wind, hydro, solar, natural gas and battery storage.

In 2018, Platte River's Board of Directors, comprised of each city's A recent look at Platte River's 24-hour energy production mix from mayor and utility director, adopted the Resource Diversification Policy calling for the pursuit of a 100% noncarbon energy mix by 2030, the most aggressive goal in the state. The board mandates reliability, financial sustainability and environmental responsibility be maintained as Platte River works toward this goal.

"Our efforts in building a clean energy future is guided by our three principles: ensuring our communities have access to reliable power they deserve, balancing our work to keeping electricity costs affordable and advocating and protecting our environment," Platte For Loveland, like Platte River's other member communities, River Chief Strategy Officer Eddie Gutierréz said. "We're proud of these investments will make our local electric grid more resilient our 50-year legacy and are determined to build out a utility of the future that understands and works with the needs of the communities and customers we humbly serve."

"As we celebrate Platte River's 50-year anniversary this year, we need to pause and celebrate a long history of operating, maintaining and delivering reliable, environmentally responsible and financially sustainable energy," Loveland Water and Power solar and wind energy must mature and become more our three other Platte River owner communities - will be on the prerequisites for supplying completely renewable energy to our customers. This includes our implementation of Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) as well as long-term plans to continually update our water and power strategies and ensure stable rate projections."

# Sprinkler backflow: What you need to know as you turn your sprinkler system back on for the season

Backflow is a plumbing term describing an unwanted flow of contaminated water going the wrong way in a pipe into clean water. Backflow can be caused by a change in water pressure inside a piping system, like when a pipe freezes or bursts.

Sprinkler systems are the most common cause of backflow in any home because they divert water from a home's main water line (containing clean, potable water) to use for irrigation. If a sprinkler pipe fractures, contaminated water from a lawn or garden can enter the pipes and flow back into your clean water supply (a huge safety issue) – unless you have a device called a backflow preventer installed on the water pipe supplying water to your sprinkler system.

As of 2016, Colorado state law required backflow preventers on all irrigation systems. While all commercial and multi-family residential properties are required to have their backflow prevention systems tested annually, single-family residential properties aren't required to – but are encouraged to test their backflow assemblies annually.

In response to this law, the City of Loveland requires permits for anyone installing a new sprinkler system or performing an expansion or modification to an existing sprinkler system, or performing anything more than a simple repair (repairing leaks or replacing sprinkler heads). These free permits ensure proper installation of backflow assemblies and proper sizing for flow and pressure demands.
