Spotlight on upcoming local holiday activities

Bright ways to make a merry holiday

The holidays are here and there are several ways to make the season merry and bright without having to leave the City of Loveland. Enjoy light displays, a scavenger hunt, shopping and more, with these fun and unique local happenings.

Holiday Lights

Visit Loveland is sponsoring several holiday activities.

Residents and visitors are encouraged to check out **Winter Wonderlights** at the Chapungu Sculpture Park, scheduled 5 to 9 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 18 through Monday, Jan. 1, 2024. At Winter Wonderlights, visitors can walk through the beautiful park and enjoy 175,000 lights including holiday string lights, twinkling bulbs, LED mappable snowflakes, illuminated African stone sculptures and 30-minute music and light shows every night. The free light and music show features eight total songs and moving lights on the 23-foot-tall LED mappable Christmas Tree. Winter Wonderlights also features three special "LIVE" events, which include musical performances, Santa, reindeer, ice carving and vendors. Winter Wonderlights LIVE nights are Saturday, Nov. 18, Saturday, Dec. 2, and Saturday, Dec. 16.

Visit Loveland, the City of Loveland, and the Winter Holiday Council were able to relocate the **12 Days of Christmas** light display that was previously located at the former Loveland Outlets to Dwayne Webster Veteran's Memorial Park. The display will be visible to the public along the park's northernmost edge along State Hwy. 34, and it will run 5 to 9 p.m., Friday, Nov. 17 through Monday, Jan. 1, 2024.

There's also the return of the **Downtown Festival of Lights**. A hometown tradition, the Loveland Downtown Partnership's Festival of Lights signature event draws local crowds into Downtown Loveland for the debut of holiday lighting along 4th Street. Celebrate the holiday season with free live music and entertainment, a tree lighting ceremony, holiday market, carriage rides, Santa and more. The Festival of Lights is scheduled 5 to 8 p.m.,

Visit Loveland will also host its annual Holiday Light Trail and gnome scavenger hunt again this year. The Holiday Light Trail is a map that guides visitors from various displays throughout the entire City. A copy of the map will be available for pickup from the Loveland Visitors Center, 5400 Stone Creek Circle, after Friday, Nov. 17. Then, starting in early December, join in the Hunt for the Loveland Holiday Gnomes and find Loveland's holiday gnome Herbie and all of his gnome friends around the city.

Also be sure to check out programs and events hosted by both the Loveland Museum and the Loveland Public Library.

In addition to rotating exhibits, programs and events, the Loveland Museum, 503 N. Lincoln Ave., has a museum store that offers distinctive gifts, books, souvenirs and more. Learn about the museum at **thelovelandmuseum.org**.













2024 Utility Rate Changes: What to expect







Total proposed increases

+\$3.89/mo (summer) and +\$10.89/mo (winter), totaling +\$102.68/year

The estimates above are based on the average utility usage of our most common system-wide customer type: single-family residential.

community-owned public utility committed to keeping costs low and reliability high for our customers. In fact, LWP offers the 12th most affordable electric rates of 55 total electric providers in Colorado.

Like most utilities, we periodically evaluate the cost of maintaining the infrastructure that provides our customers excellent water, power and wastewater services. Different types of customers - like residential and commercial - pay different rates based on the cost of providing service. We collaborate with expert rate consultants to review rates every three years, analyzing the average use of service for each group and comparing it with their unique costs. Before rates are set in stone, LWP must present its findings to the Loveland Utilities Commission (LUC) and

two governing boards review each rate class thoroughly to ensure Loveland customers are charged a fair price for service.

The proposed rate changes for 2024 include increases to water and electricity base charges, as well as increases to our wastewater and electricity usage charges. You can see what each proposed increase lovewp.org/rates; increases are related to our regional shift toward non-carbon energy generation in collaboration with our regional electric provider Platte River Power Authority and the State of Colorado (read more here: lovewp.org/renewable-energy).

How our proposed 2024 electric rates compare


Average monthly residential charge for an average monthly usage of 700 kWh:

Program Spotlight: Lawn Replacement Program

Loveland Water and Power (LWP) introduced the new Lawn Replacement Program in 2023 for water customers looking for a more affordable and helpful way to transition "water thirsty" landscaping to "water wise" landscaping - meaning landscaping that uses plants or grasses more native and tolerant to our semi-arid Colorado climate. A typical landscaping redesign can become very time-intensive or expensive, which is why LWP wanted to find ways to help customers make smart choices for their lawns and tackle projects they would be unable to complete without financial or physical assistance.

"Many residents have been asking for a program like this, and we've worked hard to implement it" LWP Residential Specialist Kim Edwards said.

We limited participation in the pilot program to ensure each customer received the support they needed. The program is managed by Resource Central, a long-time regional partner who also operates our Garden In A Box kit and Slow the Flow irrigation audit programs. We followed up with each participant to discuss their satisfaction with the program. Edwards was happy to receive an overwhelming amount of gratitude from 2023 participants, who were excited to share their feedback.

"Our initial participants loved reducing the time and money needed for the upkeep of thirsty grass or hard to maintain areas such as slopes or awkward side yard spaces," Edwards said. "Many also converted their traditional sprinkler irrigation system into a 'drip' system that can meet the low-water needs of a waterwise landscape and significantly reduce their outdoor water use."

The program operates simply. Customers determine the square footage they can commit to transitioning, take pictures of the

existing area and fill out an application with Resource Central. Once an application is approved, Resource Central will reach back out to discuss which benefits customers would like to receive - discounted labor on sod removal, a complimentary Garden In A Box, etc - and begin the project.

A new state grant allowed us to triple the amount Lawn Replacement Program projects in 2024; all LWP customers can apply beginning Jan. 1, 2024. Applications will be accepted on a first come, first served basis: lovewp.org/lawn-replacement.

Downed power line safety: Stay Safe and Stay Away



- If you spot a power line down, keep everyone, including pets, out of the area. Call Loveland Water and Power (LWP) at 970-663-1043. Never approach or try to move a downed power line.
- Always assume a downed line is energized and dangerous. Touching a live line or anything near it, like a fence or a puddle, can cause electricity to flow through your body, resulting in serious injury or death.
- If an electric line falls on your car and you're inside it, stay inside until help arrives. You are safe from electrical shock as long as you're inside the vehicle. If you must escape due to a car fire, follow these steps:
 - Leap from the open vehicle with both feet together and hands to your sides, taking care to never touch the car once you've made contact with the ground.
 - Continue to hop or make small shuffle movements with your feet together until you are at least 35 feet away from the vehicle.
