Platte River Power Authority presentation on Dixon Creek to Horseshoe Substation 230 KV Electric Transmission Line Project

DESCRIPTION:

Platte River Power Authority (PRPA) has been invited to present updated information on the above project.

SUMMARY:

On August 2, 2011, Loveland Mayor Gutierrez received a letter from Mayor Weitkunat from the City of Fort Collins, regarding the Dixon Creek to Horseshoe Substation Transmission Line Project. This attached letter requested that the Loveland City Council consider joining with the Fort Collins City Council in directing PRPA staff to investigate alternatives to building the Dixon Creek Transmission Line as currently designed through the Pineridge Natural Area. The letter suggested a 60-90 day PRPA lead study of alternatives that would still provide Loveland with equally reliable electric supply. On August 2, 2011, Loveland City Council voted to direct city staff to contact PRPA and arrange for a PRPA presentation at the August 9, 2011, regarding the issues identified in the August 2, 2011 City of Fort Collins letter.

PRPA presenters include Brian Moeck (General Manager), Jason Frisbie (Chief Operating Officer), John Bleem (Customer and Environmental Services Division Manager), and Mike Dahl

(Senior Advisor for Planning and Engineering). Please see the attached letter from PRPA regarding this project.

Dear Mayor Gutierrez:

First, I want to express our appreciation to you and the Loveland City Councilmembers for a candid and thoughtful discussion about the Dixon Transmission Line at last Thursday's joint cities/Larimer County meeting.

The Fort Collins City Council fully appreciates the dilemma we face. On one hand, this project has been in the works for six years and approximately 60 percent of rebuilding and upgrading the transmission line is complete. We recognize that work on the transmission line through the Pineridge Natural Area is scheduled to begin in September 2011 and that this line will provide critical redundant power to Loveland.

On the other hand, Fort Collins is extremely concerned about the visual impact of the poles, particularly through the Pineridge Natural Area, and places a high value on the protection of its natural areas and viewshed.

We are asking for the support of your City Council to send a joint directive to Platte River Power Authority (PRPA) staff to investigate alternatives to building the Dixon Transmission Line as designed through the Pineridge Natural Area. Our request of PRPA would be to spend the next 60-90 days investigating alternatives that will provide Loveland with an equally reliable electric supply. We would ask PRPA to consider the latest thinking in electric reliability in addition to the conventional model of alternative transmission routing. Progressive and innovative consultants are needed to help us think "outside the box."

This request is not being made lightly or without full appreciation of Loveland's need for a highly reliable electric system. Loveland's economic development efforts, such as ACE, will greatly benefit the whole region, including Fort Collins. Similarly, citizens in both communities have a great appreciation of their natural areas and view sheds. Pineridge Natural Area is enjoyed by all in our region and its existence increases the area's attractiveness to new businesses.

Because transmission lines have a 60-100 year life, this decision will impact generations and our region's attractiveness to retain as well as cultivate new businesses well into the future.



Our goals remain solid and consistent. We continue our partnership in PRPA to assure exceptional and reliable power to member communities.

We are asking for your support to present this to PRPA as soon as possible. Again, the action being requested of PRPA is to take a short period of time (60 to 90 days) to explore options for the Pineridge section and to do that in a way that does not impede Loveland having redundant power.

Time is of the essence for us all. Please let me know Loveland's decision as soon as possible.

Dear Steve:

We very much appreciate the invitation and opportunity to discuss the Dixon Creek to Horseshoe transmission line and substation addition with the Loveland City Council. Thank you as well for providing the letter sent by Mayor Weitkunat.

I will plan to attend, along with two or three of my Platte River colleagues, the August 9, 2011, Special Meeting of the Loveland Council. As suggested in the Mayor's letter and in your email, we will be prepared to discuss several aspects of the project including: the reason for the project and the several various alternatives studied prior to gaining approval of the current project; the current schedule for project completion; a description of all three phases of the project and the public processes involved; possible short term alternatives including distributed energy sources and the potential impacts if a study period and delay are supported. We will also plan to show some slides of past underground transmission projects and the potential environmental impacts that have some people concerned. I have also recently received an engineering estimate from Black & Veatch for undergrounding in the Pineridge area as originally suggested by Fort Collins and some before-and-after pictures of the Pineridge area, if rebuilt overhead, prepared for us by EDAW.

We look forward to seeing you and Council on the 9th.

RE: Downtown Developer Recruitment Strategy

Background:

The City has taken active steps to recruit developers into Downtown Loveland including the completion of the Downtown Vision Book and the Request for Proposals. Our efforts have yielded some success including the Rialto Bridge project, the Art Space project and the Brinkman proposal for the North Catalyst project. The North Catalyst project is expected to come before Council in the fall.

Staff is interested in engaging Council in a discussion to continue these successes by attracting additional developers to Downtown Loveland.

Developer Solicitation/Revolving RFP:

Staff is seeking to develop a fully transparent and public process to identify and engage developers on downtown development process. This effort would expand on the work of the Downtown Strategic Plan and the Downtown Vision Book and contribute to the ongoing revitalization effort. Specifically, we are seeking projects that promote vertical density and greater activity.

The solicitation effort would identify specific areas in Downtown available for development and include some examples of the type of development. The examples would be similar to what was included in the Downtown Vision Book (see image on the next page). The developer solicitation would be posted on the City's website and updated as needed. Additionally, staff would make copies available to both large and small developers with an interest in developing in Downtown Loveland.

Further, the solicitation would include some basic criteria for evaluating development proposals prior to entering into negotiation.

The response criteria will likely include:

- 1. Concept Plan and Project description
- 2. Project Budget
- 3. Project Pro Forma

Exclusive Right to Negotiate

Provided that the developer meets the basic criteria, staff would present to Council the proposal with a request to engage in negotiations for a set period of time. Given the need for transparency, staff would seek Council approval prior to engaging in negotiations with a developer.
